A very delightful afternoon was spent at the home of Mrs. Tyler when Mrs. Duttweiler was given a farewell party. Luncheon was served in conclusion.

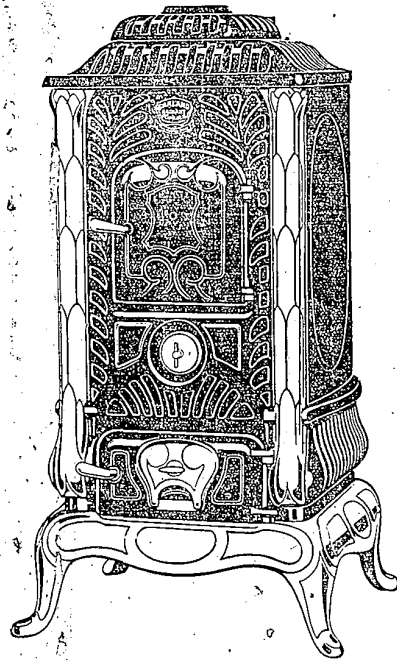
Clarenceville Lodge, No. 42 gave a dance at White's Hall, Wednesday, September 30. There was a good attendance.
