WHY SO RAMPANT?

ANSWERED FROM LANSING

The following report sent out from Lansing yesterday explains in a great measure why crime is rampant:

Nearly 25 per cent of the state's prison population has been turned loose on parole this year by Governor Alex. J. Groesbeck, despite widespread hue and cry over increasing crime, and resentment of judges and other officers over what they characterize as nullification of their efforts at law enforcement.

Th last month on record, August, shows that 184 prisoners were liberated on parole in that period while 166 were received. Paroles for the first eight months of this year total 1,031. These figures cover the penal institutions at Jackson, Marquette, Ionia and the Detroit House of Correction. State prisoners, mostly women, are boarded at the latter prison.

Since the new parole system was set up, experimentally by the legislature of 1921, giving the governor complete control over issuance of paroles as part of his monopoly of authority in state

government, a total of 6,566 prisoners have been paroled. Many of them have been let out prior to highway construction work and by completion of their minimum sentences, and cases are numerous of cases, those of Harry Johnson, where recommendations of judges Detroit murderer, and Ivan Hill, for confinement midway between brother of Harry Hill, who is now minimum and maximum terms serving time at Marquette for the murder for which Leo Sauerman State-wide attention was attracted to the parole system by
