FULL FLIVVERS AND EMPTY COACHES

Commencing October 15, a new scale of fares was put into effect by the Peoples Motor Coach on the Detroit-Milford line, the coaches serving this community. The fare now between Detroit and Farmington is 45 cents. The minimum charge for fare is 10 cents, which exactly doubles the rate to and from the Junction to this point.

The coach and trolley service is of incalculable value to this community. The loss of either would be keenly felt and the loss of both would be a calamity.

It is the claim of the company that the coaches are not earning a fair amount, which probably is true. The company is certainly entitled to a fair profit and without it service can not be rendered.

The company no doubt gave every angle of the situation close study before deciding to make the raise, and is no doubt honestly convinced that a raise in fares is necessary in order to insure a profit.

There are those outside the official circle of the company who claim that every raise made in the past has resulted in a decrease in the number of passengers carried.

To an extent that lessened the cash receipts and stimulated the demand for second hand autos among patrons of the lines who live in the country and work in the large factories at Detroit.

One such car will represent about eight fares daily that might go into the coffers of the company if a fare was charged approximating that which the owner of the flivver collects for taking his neighbor to and from work.

As a last resort why not try lowering the fare?

DUNCAN SISTERS AT NEW DETROIT

After a long triumph in the West, more than a year in Chicago, many months in New York and Boston, the Duncan Sisters, Vivian and Rosetta, will return to the New Detroit Opera House Sunday night, October 18th for an engagement of one week only, to again test their popularity with local audiences as "Topsy and Eva."

This play is based on Harriet Beecher Stowe's immortal "Uncle Tom's Cabin," and the characters are there from Simon Legree to Eliza. Poor Eliza is insignificant enough, just running in to do a few high kicks and some jazz steps and then disappear, but "Topsy and Eva" was made and patterned to fit the Duncan Sisters by Catherine Chisholm Cushing, so that it is somewhat of a personally conducted tour of the stars who have contributed the music and lyrics.

Rosetta, who plays "Topsy," stamped herself as a comedienne years ago. Her comic vein is unlimited. She clowns like Al Jolson and turns somersaults as easily as Fred Stone. Nothing that will produce a laugh is beyond her reach. They are capital entertainers with their perfect harmonies sung together to the accompaniment of guitar or ukulele. Beside the Duncan Sisters are the London Palace Theatre Dancers, ten lily-limbed girls as expertly drilled as a football eleven, who dance with precise gyration and Tiller speed. There is, too, the charming prima donna, Aimee Torriani, who sings better than 50 per cent of the musical comedy heroines, and Ed-

mund Fitzpatrick as Uncle Tom, to offer bass solos. Rosetta, the little young specialty dancer, gives exquisitely graceful exhibitions of her art, and there is a chorus with real singing voices.

The production is unique in style with its pickaninny chorus and crinolines and is gracefully staged. You may miss the blood-hounds and ice scene that were in "Uncle Tom's Cabin," or the whipping post, but there are lots of things in "Topsy and Eva" that weren't in "Uncle Tom's Cabin" and first of all, the Duncan Sisters.

Besides the Duncans, the company includes Vernon Rickard, Antoinette Boots, William Gordon, Edmund Fitzpatrick, Hal Sands, Myrtle Ferguson, Aimee Torriani, Dan Brennan, Bert Keyes, Isabelle Mohr, Marguerite Bell and the London Palace Theatre Dancers.

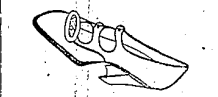
