Màny Answers Needed On Proposed Stadium

Mel Ravitz. scholarly president of the Detroit Common Council, has posed some interesting questions regarding the proposed stadium for the downtown sac.

Speaking informally at the coming out party for Bob Sweany, newly appointed executive director of the Downtown Stadium Working Group. The council president asked:

With four proposals to make the final/decision?

How will it require the displacement of many families?

What about the traffic problem?

IN MENTIONING the four proposed sites he listed the area just west of Cobo Hall; one south of Michigan Avenue and Trumbull proposed by John E. Fetzer, owner of the Tigers; the one proposed

by Councilman Billy Rogell, north of the present stadium, and the State Fair Crounds

DURING THE discussion it was pointed out that one of the major factors in select-ing the site close by Cobo Hall was the financing plan

whereby the Detroit Parking Authority, that normally places its surplus in a fund for expansion, will agree to place it in the stadium pool to meet interest charges on the revenue bonds.

In the other areas the fi-nancing may be a problem, even though the cost may be lower than the Cobo Hall site.

"You can't even mention displacement of families". Ravitz pointed out, "until you have a place to put them.

"That means we will have to have a new housing pro-ject and these things take time. In Rogell's plan he wants to build what would virtually amount to a small city"

IN OTHER AREAS, par-ticularly Soldier Field in Chicago, Kennedy Stadium in Philadelphia, the Coliseum in Los Angeles, and now the Astrodome in Houston, Tex-as, facilities are considered "white elephants".

For that reason the Detroit For that reason the Detroit proponents are considering plans for sources of revenue between events. Proposed sources run the gamut from commercial business to offices and restaurants and high class cocktail lounges.


