# County Commissioner Powell Tells Pledges

Oakland County Commissioner Christian F. Powell has announced his candidacy for a second term and promises to continue his efforts to provide tax relief for homeowners.

POWELL FILED for the August 4 primary on the Republican ticket for his present position as county commissioner representing the 18th District, which includes the northern part of Farmington Township, West Bloomfield Township, the City of Orchard Lake Village and the southwest corner of Bloomfield Township.

"I must seek a second term to follow to fruition the several

programs I launched for the county during my first term," explained Powell.

"These programs included proposed legislation to increase Oakland County's share of state gas and weight taxes of which this county has long received less than its share."

"Also, legislation relieving the property tax burdens as well as inequities due to unfair and outmoded assessment practices."

THE CANDIDATE is a resident of Union Lake and a partner in the law firm of Powell, Pines, Carr, and Jacques of Pontiac.

Before turning lawyer, he worked as a tax accountant

and profit and budget analyst.

Powell entered politics in 1959 as a member of the Board of Supervisors of the Michigan State University.

In 1960, he was an unsuccessful candidate for the House of Representatives in District 3. For the next four years, Powell served as a planning commissioner for West Bloomfield Township.

He became active in county Republican circles and in 1964 was elected chairman of the 19th Republican Congressional Executive Committee.

Powell was elected to the Oakland County Board of Commissioners two years ago and has served on the following committees: Finance, Regional Affairs, Committee on Committees, and chairman of the legislative committee.

He is married to Mrs. Patricia Powell and has two children, received his B.S. in commerce from Ferris State University and law degree from Detroit College of Law.

A TOTAL OF 157 youngsters in the southern section of the community enjoyed their first swim of the year Tuesday at the Farmington Municipal Pool. During the three swim days last week, 438 children took to the water.

This same three-day period saw 382 children on the playgrounds enjoying draft and athletic activities.
