**Don't Let
Your Fuse Blow**

It's annoying to have a fuse blow in the midst of your work; but don't forget that it does so for your protection. You have overlooked the circuit and created a fire hazard.

The ordinary light outlet will safely carry a load of 1000 watts. Don't put more upon it. The electric appliances that you use have their capacity in watts stamped on it, so you can't go astray. If you find that you wish to use more than you should on one outlet, have an additional outlet put in.

To figure how many portable lamps you can safely attach to one outlet in the living room, add together the wattage of the lamp bulbs used.
