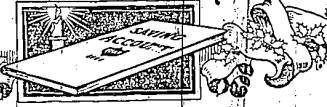

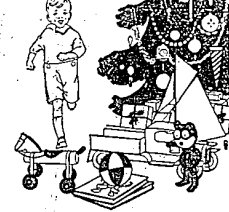
A Christmas Greeting from Your Library
