TORE PERSONNEL at Danny's market at Farmington and Six Mile won't forget Diane Bartsch for awhile.

The Millord resident zipped into the store recently, bought 23-bags of groceries (three carts overflowing) worth \$276.81 and spent a whopping \$3,98.

Bartsch — if you haven't already guessed — is a couponer. And a careful one. The fact that she was shopping in Livonia is evidence of how cloca cattention she pays to what's happening on the supermarket scene.

DANNY'S, SHE notes, is the only narket that currently doubles the \$1

Coupon.

Bartsch is a divorced mother of two young daughters and grew up in Farmington. She got into serious couponing several years ago when she was laid off from her \$400-a-week secretarial job — just before Christmas.

"I knew I had to do something," she recalls. "I couldn't cut such things as my rent. The only place was in food."

Bartsch has become so successful in the art of couponing that she now does it full time, more or less. In addition to clipping and filing the labels of all name brands, she edits a pocket-sized newsletter called "Dollars and Dimes" that lists every offer available through coupons.

PEOPLE ARE throwing money way every day, she says, because they

are not aware of the refunds major brands offer. Last year, for instance, she said, she collected \$4,000 in re-funds.

Some time or other during the course of a year, she said, name brand food food companies will have a refund. Some are as high as \$5. Tide detergent labels, for instance, are worth a \$1. Bartisch added that if the offer inn't at least a \$1, she doesn't bother with it.

Organization is the key to couponing, ahe said. Every day she scans the newspapers and files away the offers in an unlancy shoebox-tize container. And ahe saves every label abe can get her hands on. When it comes time to go abopping — that's about every two mouths — she packs up the box and begins her wheeling and dealing.

"IT'S FUN," she smiles. "It's like they're paying me to buy their groceries."
