Jewish leaders have mixed views on Jackson's Syrian initiative

Jewish community leaders had mixed feelings about the Rev. Jesse Jackoo's recent success in obtaining the release of a U.S. Navy officer held captive in Syria. While lauding his success, their reac-tions to his political sympathies and in-volvement in the Middle East range from apathy to uneasiness. "I haven't heard any community re-action to Jackson," said Alvin Kushner, executive director of the Jewish Com-munity Council in Detroit. "People might be personally upset with him.
