Photo gallery opens second exhibition

More than 100 black and white and color photographs are on display in "Recent Acquisitions: Contemporary Photographs" at Detroit Institute of Arts through Feb. 5.

This is the second exhibition in the museum's recently opened Peggy and Albert de Salle Gallery of Photography and is comprised of work done since 1980.

Photography by Diane Arbus, Howard Bond, Harry Callahan, Elliott Erwitt, Ralph Gibson, Mischa Gordin, Helen Levitt, Joel Meyerowitz, Nick

Nizan, Bill Rauhauer, Aaron Siskind, Carl Toth and Brett Weston are among the works acquired by gift and purchase for the permanent collection.

The nucleus of the exhibit is contemporary work acquired through a 1981 National Endowment for the Arts grant of \$50,000 for the purchase of photographs of living artists. This amount was matched in 1982 by the Drawing and Print Club of the Founders Society of Detroit Institute of Arts.

With the funding, 23 photographs by other artists were bought for the permanent collection of the department of graphic arts.

Now in the collection are works by Bruce Barnbaum, Martha Burns, Paul Caponigro, William Chitt, Jed Devine, Rita Dillib, Rick Dugan, Roland L. Freeman, Timothy Greenfield-Sanders and Jan Groover.

Others represented are John Gruen, Steven W. Lewis, Ray Metzker, Denby Moers, Oliver Parker, Robert J. Steinberg, Joel Sternfeld and Jane Tucker.

All of these works are displayed for the first time in the current show. Among the Michigan photographers in the show are Monte Nagler, Jim Raymo, John Gans, Carla Anderson, Douglas J. Alkenhead, Michael Sarnacki, Hugh Grannan, Jerry Sadowski, Richard Shirk and Ollie Sprow as well as Bond, Gordin, Rathausen and Toth.

The exhibition is open without charge during regular museum hours, 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday-Sunday. Closed Mondays and holidays, Dec. 24, 25, 31 and Jan. 1.

College president speaks to men's club

The Farmington Men's Club will meet at noon Thursday, Jan. 19 in Farmington Community Center, 24705 Farmington Road. Monthly meetings include a speaker followed by lunch and social gathering.

January's speaker is Dr. Stuart M. Bundy, president of Henry Ford Community College. Bundy will be speaking on the development and strife of Central America.

His experience on the development of these countries stems from his educational missionary work as co-director and later president of the Evangelical Schools of Central America. In these capacities, he was involved in the development of a national extension program for Guatemala especially in semimillitary areas, an educational publishing house and several service institutions.

FOLLOWING THE massive earth-

quake in Guatemala in February, 1976, Bundy was invited by the Ministry of Education of the Republic of Guatemala to serve on relief missions to demolished educational institutions and as a consultant on earthquake-resistant educational constructional.

Upon his return to the states, he was appointed as president of Palo Verde College and vice president of Cerritos College.

Bundy's service to the community was acknowledged by the Dearborn Bar Association when he was awarded the Liberty Bell Award. His interests in Central American development continue as he serves as a member of the Board of Overseers of Latin American Studies.

Fee for beards



Beards were once subject to government control in Russia. Those seeking to wear whiskers needed an official permit and had to pay a fee.

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


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
