While in the Ruider corner, the spotlight illuminated some other top performances. Kara Karhu took third place in the bars (7.35), the floor exercise (8.9) and thed for third with communic Lisa Brundle on the vault (7.9).

teammate Marilyn Dunn tied for fourth on hars, each scoring 7.45. The spollight next shone on Farm-ington's highly talented junior Katle MacIntosh. MacIntosh was stricken with the flu, but that couldn't keep her out of the lineup. "She said she didn't want to let the team down so she's going to compete. But, she's really sick," Feeney said be-fore the meet.

"No, not really," she said. "I keep improving my scores. That's all I can do."


The spoilight not only illuminates talent, but it eathers bear, guis and desire as well. MacIntosh and teammate

Dennis relaxed when freshman Tracey Solomon hit an 8.25 on her uneven parallel bars routine. The mark not only took first place, but it broke a school record set in 1979 by Kathy Purcell of 8.20.

HAWK TEAMMATE Jill Birsa scored an 8.05 to take third on the bars, and Harrison was off and running.

"We had been in sort of a slump re-cently, but when we hit bars, I was re-lieved. It was the first time we hit bars all year," said Dennis.

In addition to her first on bars, Solo-mon won the floor exercise (8.40), and took second on both the vault (8.2) and the beam (8.20).

Solomon was second all-around with 33.05 points and Birsa was third with 31.2. Both all-around scores were personal bests for the two Hawks.

Cathy Heiter took all-around honors for Northville, winning the vault (8.35), the beam (8.55) and taking seconds in the bars (8.15) and floor (8.35).

The Hawks (8-6 overall, 5-1 in the league) will travel to Walled Lake Central Monday.

al title.


