

Harrison netters surprise Churchill

The Farmington Harrison volleyball team pulled a stunning upset Monday night, knocking off No. 3-ranked Livonia Churchill, 15-15, 15-9, 15-10.

"It was a lot of fun," said a happy Hawk coach Ron Shortt.

Churchill had lost just one league match prior to Monday night, that to No. 1-ranked Livonia Stevenson.

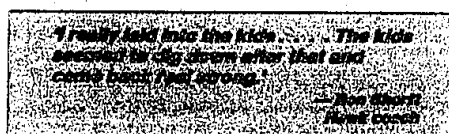
"Both teams started out very slowly," said Shortt. "I didn't think either team had it."

The Hawks were the team to wake

up first, thanks to a between game barage from Shortt.

"I really laid into the kids," he said. "I had been talking division title all week. And this was an important division contest. Believe it or not, we're 4-1 in our division. The kids seemed to dig down after that and came back real strong."

Deanne Kool perhaps dug down the deepest. She played her finest match of the season, according to Shortt. She was successful on 97 percent of her passes, and made 11 of 13 spikes with five kills.



Karen Sklar was also very effective at the net, taking sets from both Jennifer Hughes and Laurie Ambrose. Harrison is 4-9 overall this season, but the Hawks are 4-1 against Western lead.

"This was a big bump for us to get over," Shortt said. "I think it was a great win. The kids really hung together when they could have easily folded after losing the first game."

The Hawks travel to Walled Lake Western tonight for another Western Division match.

NORTH FARMINGTON was on the brink of defeat Monday night at Garden City, when Patti Kozicki took charge. The Raiders, ranked No.2 in Ob-

serveland, lost the first game 15-13 and were trailing 15-10 in game two. That's when Kozicki went back to serve.

Two quick aces later, Garden City called timeout.

"It was 15-12 and Patti came to the bench and said, 'You guys, I'm mad,'" said North coach Sandy Lubienicki.

After the timeout, Kozicki served out the game, five straight points, to give the Raiders a 15-13 comeback win. They went on to blow the Cougars out in game three, 15-10, to win the match.

THE PANTHERS' fourth-quarter fade can be attributed to these numbers: they hit just two of 13 shots, three of eight free throws and committed four turnovers.

It can also be attributed to some outstanding performances by Scott Hayosh and Tim Berry.

Hayosh came off the Falcon bench to spark the Falcons' initial comeback. The Falcons trailed by 10 at the end of the first quarter when Hayosh entered. He scored 10 points in the second quarter to help pull Farmington within three.

"Scott had been a starter for us," Roy said. "He has been in a shooting slump. Tonight he played his finest game of the season. We're not that quick a team, and he's our fastest player. He makes a lot of things happen."

Also playing his best game of the season was Berry. Shooting mostly from the perimeter, Berry canned 22 points, 11 in each half.

"We seem to have a knack for getting kids going," Björke said. "We seem to be able to stop the big guns, but somebody else always seems to play unconscious against us."

BERRY ALSO made two key steals in the fourth quarter which led to three-point plays by Hayosh and Carruthers, triggering Farmington's comeback.

RU did a good job holding Farmington's top scorer, Carruthers, to just 11 points.

Copely led the Panthers with 18 points. Mike Hartle, subbing for injured Richard Williams, scored 15. Keith Roloff scored 14.

After making 12 of 25 shots in the first half, RU cooled to 10 of 33 in the second. Farmington, not much better, was a cold 12 of 31 in the first half, and 10 for 25 in the second — but the Falcons were 4 of 19 from the line in the second half.

The win stops a four game losing streak for the Falcons, who's record is now 4-12. RU's record falls to 1-13.
