Madonna's pride is its new library

"It's hard not to notice us. This gives us a lot of visibility from the road," said Mary VanAlsten, director of public relations at Madonna College.

VanAlsten was referring to the college's new \$4.1 million library/classroom addition that cuts an impressive figure in stone and United States motorists traveling along the Jeffries or Levan and Schoolcraft roads.

Books and other materials were moved into the new library in December during the college's holiday break.

Students began using the facility when they returned for winter term last month.

The \$2,000-square-foot, two-story building includes four classrooms, a lecture hall, a center for personalized instruction and faculty offices as well as a library. Other features include an archival room, a gallery for art exhibits and other displays, three private conference rooms and individual study carrels, many of which are equipped with audio visual materials.

Designed by the Livonia architectural firm of Kamp-Dicono, the library is open to Madonna students and alumni.

The Madonna facility also holds the Livonia Bar Association Law Library.

The library contains 100,000 books and is equipped with an electronic security system. A brick archway accents offices and private conference rooms and separates two sections of the library. With its large expanse of windows, light plays an important part in creating a warm, comfortable atmosphere.

The new library has a capacity for 225,000 books — more than double that of the old library.

Ethnic heritage study alcoves are part of the new library. Although many

are yet to be stocked, the alcoves will contain a variety of ethnic artifacts.

Decorated in blue and burnt orange, the new library/classroom addition is receiving rave reviews from students and faculty.

"It's beautiful" and "it's great" are comments offered by students on their way to class in the new building or to study in the library.

Sister Mary Lydia, director of the library, beams when she discusses the new facility. She's joined by 12 full-time and six part-time staff members.

Only a few minor decorations and additional furnishings are needed to

complete the library. The rooms have yet to be decorated for several large benefactors. All that is expected to be completed before the building's official dedication in June.

Plans call for remodeling the old library for use as a bookstore, classrooms and administrative offices. The cost of the renovation is estimated at \$800,000 which the college still needs to raise.

The college recently received \$250,000 from the Kresge Foundation in Troy to complete funding for construction of the addition. The lecture hall has been designated as the Kresge Lecture Hall.

The gift came at the end of a six-month challenge grant period in which the college raised more than \$500,000 to meet conditions approved by the foundation.

"To meet the challenge grant period, many individuals, corporations and foundations responded to our appeal," said Sister Mary Francellence, Madonna president. "Gifts ranged from \$1 to \$25,000 and included appreciated securities and works of art."
