Williams) wanted to recess, go into a back room or something. Thankfully, Vagnozzi said, Councilwoman Joan Dudley cautioned Williams that "there would be no caucusing of members during this break."

Wolf responded to Vagnozzi's charges, saying he was the one who asked Williams to recess so he could go to the restroom.

Also annoying was Williams' "zeal to

pin a label on everyone else," Vagnozzi said, referring to the mayor's synopsis Feb. 6 that the council's tie votes showed that members were choosing candidates based on their own "liberal" or "conservative" political feelings. Williams also asked at least one candidate how she would politically describe herself.

"There was the mayor asking the James Watt question: Are you a liberal or an American?" Vagnozzi said in a telephone interview Tuesday.

TELLING COUNCIL that it seemed like they were picking a candidate for the chamber of commerce or the Republican party rather than for a non-partisan city council, Vagnozzi added, "I saw many council members trying to get someone who was their ideological twin."

Admitting that "there were some negatives and they did bother me" specifically when Councilman Joe Alkateeb and Dudley "started in on the attack" — Wolf said, "I'm not sure

anyone was looking for an ideological twin."

Instead, the council — and Wolf in particular — was trying to find out where each candidate stood on certain ideas and issues, such as taxes, Wolf said.

On Tuesday, however, Vagnozzi admitted that while most of the council's questions to the candidates "were below average," Wolf's questions at least dealt with the major issue of city taxes.

While patting Wolf on the back for

his line of questioning, Vagnozzi criticized Alkateeb's questions — particularly of Sever and his attendance in civic organizations such as the Rotary and chamber of commerce — as unfair.

"I don't think it's fair to say I attacked Mr. Sever," Alkateeb responded, adding he simply had concerns about Sever as a councilman.

"The reason I brought up some of these points was because they bothered me, my conscience," Alkateeb added.

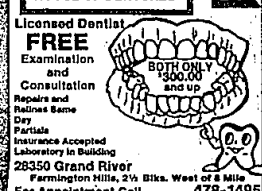

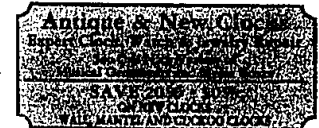
