Amy Austin's bat and Suzette Greenberg's newly found control helped the North Farmington girls' softball team defeat Garden City 7-3 in a key North-West Suburban match-up Friday.

Austin went 3-for-4, scored four runs and knocked in two to pace the Raiders' nine-hit attack. Michelle Rosen put the game out of reach in the fourth with a big two-run double.

But, the real story was Greenberg. The senior batter has struggled to find the plate in her first two outings, but on a rainy Friday, she found her groove — somewhat.

Raiders beat Glenn in NSL showdown

"Just an outstanding day."

That's how North Farmington boys track coach Rob Henderson summarized it.

The Raiders came home with a 69-68 victory after traveling to Westland to take on a talented John Glenn team Thursday.

"We had 13 personal bests today," Henderson said. The win was extra special for the Henderson who earned his first coaching victory. He took over the post this season for long-time coach Ron Holsen, who is now the Farmington athletic director.

"We're just elated," he said. "Before we started I did some projecting. I figured we'd lose by a couple points, but the kids really came through."

Sophomore Kirk Armstrong clinched the victory when he won the 3,200-meter run. His time was 10:30.5.

The Raiders were strong in the field events, winning four of the five. Brian Hood won both the shot put (44-5) and the discus (135-1). Pat Henderson hit his best mark in the high jump, going 5-10, and Victor Shaw took the long jump in 19-4.

Shaw also won 300-meter dash (23.8) and ran legs on both of North's first-place relays, the 400-meter and 800-meter.

Dave Kramer, Shaw, Tom Doerr and Scott combined on a 465-2 to win the 400-meter relay. It was Kramer, Doerr, Mark Anders and Shaw combining to win the 800-meter relay in 1:38.0.

Mickey Reul was also a winner, running a 53.5 in the 400-meter dash.

Runk wins 4 in Hawk rout

Lauri Runk led the Farmington Harrison girls track team to a record-setting 113-14 massacre of Livonia Clarenceville Thursday.

Runk, an All-Area cross-country performer last fall, won four events for the Hawks. She took the high jump with a 4-8, the long jump with a 15-8, the 1,600-meter run in 5:52.0 and the 3,200-meter run in 15:05.0.

The 113 team points is the most ever earned by the Hawks in a dual meet. The Hawks are now 2-0, and in both meets Runk has won four events.

Harrison runners captured first in every event, but coach Mark Babcock isn't about to let his crew get complacent.

"We still have a long ways to go," he said. "Some of the times weren't that good. We'll get our first real test Tuesday."

The Hawks host Northville Tuesday. Jill Birska and Tracy Brod each won two individual events.

Birska won the 100-meter high hurdles (16.7) and the 200-meter dash (28.2), while Brod won the discus (88-4) and the 400-meter dash (1:04.4). Both also contributed to winning relay teams.

Birska, Carol Kopko, Jamie Holcomb and Carla Primo combined to win both sprint relays — they ran a 53.0 in the 400-meter and a 1:54.3 in the 800-meter relays.

In the 1,600-meter relay, Jamie

Lyons, Kopko, Renee Brzozdek and Brod won with a 4:33.9. Sherry Novia, Andrea Prescott, Jenny Anderson and Brod won the 3,200-meter relay in 11:29.3.

Other winners for Harrison were Lisa Anna in the shot put (27-3), Holcomb in the 200-meter low hurdles (50.7), Primo in the 100-meter dash (13.8), and Anderson in the 800-meter run (2:41.3).

NORTH FARMINGTON got its first Northwest Suburban League test Thursday — it wasn't a pretty sight.

Powerful Westland John Glenn, expected to win the NSL with ease this year, rolled over the Raiders 84-44.

North escaped with just three first-place finishes.

"Glenn is just an excellent team," said Raider assistant coach Greg Grodzicki. "Only 17 people got off their bus, but 14 of them played. And they are all sophomores and juniors. They'll clean up at the league meet. No one will be able to stop them."

Laina Shaw won the 100-meter high hurdles for North, running a 17.8. Tammy Spengler was also a winner, taking the 300-meter dash in 27.6.

The last Raider victory came in the 400-meter relay. Shaw, Audrey Niskar, Diane Ritchie and Dina Cole combined on a 53.7.
