Dems say county scandal looms

It's jokingly called the "Battersgate" scandal.

But Democrats aren't kidding about charges that
Oakland County Executive Daniel Murphy used
public food for private fund-raisers.

Despite a county andit and star Potice investigation, they're not conviseed Republicans provided
their own pancakes and syrup for the events. And
Democrat commissioners intend to sak for a grandplany investigation if they don't get answers soon.

"IT'S A whitewash," charged Commissioner Betty Fortino, D-Pontiac, who said she found tols of
contradictions in the just-released audit.
"I hope we can do something to have some kind
of proper investigation. I hope we don't have to go
to a grand jury."
Commissioner Lawrence-Pernick, D-Southfield,
called the audit "disappointing." But that's what be
expected of an investigation "done by people who
report to the person being investigated.
"Allegations have been made of grand misms of
public funds for private purposes. And that's a
crithe," stressed Pernick.
"At a time when the public has concerns over the
credibility of public officials, there has to be some
sort of outside investigation."

THE FLAP grew out of an Oakland Press investigation of the county's food-service operation. The paper alleged that food from the courthouse cafeteria was served at political fund-raisers for Murphy. About 1970 of the press of the county of

and 1981. But after the internal audit ordered by his office, the executive told county commissioners there was no "wroegdi use of food or other items."

Murphy said food was donated but not ahown on his finance reports because volunteers failed to fill out proper forms.

Released to the public Monday, the audit reported finding "no direct evidence or testimony — nor any indirect voldence or; testimony — that would indicate that items were ever used from the food services for the fund-raisers other than those events which were properly billed and paid for."

THE EXECUTIVE, though, did sak State Police to look into the growing controversy. That investigation ended quickly when no crime showed up. Inspector Stuart Hutchings said the audit showed food-service management problems, but no criminal wrongdoing. So state police decided not to probe further. "Our business is to investigate crime," explained the assistant district commander in charge of criminal criminal criminal commander in charge of criminal c

"Otherwise we're witch hunting, and we're not going to do that."

To charges that police backed off on the case because it involves Murphy, Hutchings said politics never influences his work.

"We're the State Police. We're not involved in that county," he said firmly. "And the executive branch I work for is now run by Democrats."

BUT COUNTY DEMOCRATS, long concerned about casteria desicits, are still suspicious. Last week deputy county executive William Spinelli toid them State Police wrapped up their investigation and found on wrongdoing. Objecting to not seeing the audit, Democrats also questioned why the matter is not being probed further.

Pernick, frequently the Democratic caucus spokersman, sald the county prosecutor, state attorney general and State Police all refused do Investigate.

"The trooy is that we can't find any branch of law enforcement to investigate wrong doing," said law enforcement to investigate wrong doing," said Fernick. "The only way, then, to get an investiga-tion is to ask for a grand jury."

"I'M GOING to make one more effort to try to

clarify what happened and why it happened," Spi-oelli tuid augry Democrats.
"After a very thorough investigation, the attor-ney general, prosecutor and state police all found no factual evidence to pursue this.
"No one is making accusations. What you have is a reporter going through campaign materials and coming to conclusions not based in fact," he added. "A reasonable person can conclude the matter is closed."

MURPHY STAFFERS said the executive's office ok the investigation very seriously. For one thing, a executive doesn't want an election year scan-

the executive doesn't want an election year scandal.

"We don't want an October surprise," said Patrick W. Nowak, deputy county executive and Murphy's chief political side.

"Look at it from our point of view politically. And that's what this is — politics. Whenever the oppositie party sees something they can put in the worst possible light, they do it."

Pernick, who has been raising questions about the county-food-service management for years, disagrees strongly.

"The best way to make sure there is no political corruption is to make sure there is no ustake, independent body investigating charges. That way it cannot be a political hing," said the commissioner from Southfield.

"This is clearly a Watergate-type coverup where those involved are going around yelling 'politics' and hoping it will go away."




