

# Borgess runs past Mercy

How important are field events in a track meet?

Ask Farmington Hills Our Lady of Mercy coach Bob Kirkland — but ask him after the Easter break, OK?

Kirkland's Marlins fell behind by 20 points after the four field events Thursday in their meet against No. 3-ranked Bishop Borgess — those 20 points proved to be about the margin of victory for the Spartans, 74-55.

It was the third straight defeat for the Marlins, the first in the Catholic League. "Typically, it was an even meet," said Borgess coach John McGrover. "We just built too big a lead in the field events. That's what we wanted to do against them."

**SOPHOMORE TERRI** Ford had an outstanding meet for Mercy. The versatile athlete won the high jump (the

Marlins' only points in the field events) with a leap of 4-10.

Ford also won both sprint races, the 100-meter dash (12.8) and the 200-meter dash (28.3), and she teamed with Bev White, Laurie Huston and Colleen Flynn to win the 1,600-meter relay in 4:22.0.

The Marlins also won the 3,200-meter relay in a time of 11:41.03. Ellen McCarthy, an All-Area cross country performer last fall, swept the

distance events for Mercy. She won the 1,600-meter (5:33.6) and the 3,200-meter (12:21.8).

Other winners for Mercy: Tracy Balog won the 100-meter high hurdles (18.7) and Huston won the 800-meter run (2:35.8).

The Marlins will be looking for their first win Tuesday against Dearborn Divisions Child. The meet will be run at 2 p.m. at U-D High School.

# Raider runners sweep Cougars

One set of track teams embarked jubilantly on its Easter vacation, another set began on a down note.

The jubilation went with the girls and boys track contingents from North Farmington. On Wednesday, the boys track team defeated Garden City 83-54. The Raider girls defeated the Lady Cougars 75-53 the same day.

Brian Hood paced the boys team winning three events and anchoring one of four first-place relay teams. Hood captured the shot put (46-10 1/4), the discus (104-5) and the 100-meter dash (12.0).

He teamed with Joe Sakofake, Victor Shaw and Tom Doerz to go 47.1 and win the 400-meter relay.

The Raiders, running without the services of seniors Mickey Ruel and

David Kramer who were in Florida, got a big lift from its relay teams.

"ACTUALLY, WITH those people gone, I was kind of hoping for a snow storm," joked North coach Rob Henderhan. "We knew we had to win all four relays."

Doerr, Kevin Kopko, Mark Adams and Shaw combined on a 1:59.0 to win the 800-meter relay.

In the 1,600-meter relay, Kopko, Pete Hemanke, Craig Ragland and Ken Weisne won in 5:52.0. Weisne, Mike Bindow, Rocky Nill and Steve Urwin took first for the first time this season in the 3,200-meter relay with a 14:49.0.

Other firsts for the Raiders were: Shaw in the 200-meter dash (24.2); Hemanke in the 400-meter dash (55.6); and Weisne in the 800-meter run (2:08.5).

The Raiders also got a big lift from Sakofake and freshman Andy Avery. They took second and third place, respectively, behind Hood in the discus.

The Raiders are 2-0 in the Northwest Suburban League and 2-1 overall.

**THE GIRLS TEAM** also used strength in the relay events to overpower the Cougars. The Raiders won three of the four relay events.

Freshman Tammy Spengler led the Raider effort with three individual firsts and she anchored the winning 800-yard relay. She won the high jump (4-7), the 100-yard dash (12.3) and the 220-yard dash (28.19).

Spengler, Denna Cole, Wendy Love, and Diane Ritchie combined to run a

1:56.6 to win the 880-yard relay.

Beth Emery and Lalana Shaw each won two events for the Raiders. Emery won the 800-yard run (2:33.08) and the mile run (6:56.8). Shaw won the long jump (15-11 1/4) and the 330-yard low hurdles (49.65).

Jill Shuler won the 440-yard dash in 1:02 for the Raiders.

"Winning three of the four relays helped us a lot," said Raider coach Ralph Temby.

Kathy Koteras, Terry Spengler (Tammy's sister), Shuler and Cole won the mile relay in 4:43.5. In the 2-mile relay, Emery, Susan Hamblin, Koteras, and Anne Beusteren won in 11:10.45. The Raiders are now 2-1 overall, 1-1 in the NSL.

proved this year. Going into last weekend's four-game set with Indiana, MSU was 14-15 for the year. However, the Spartans lost three of four at Ohio State April 14-15.

Hanis, now the team's No. 1 catcher as a sophomore, has nearly matched last year's marks already. He has two doubles, a triple and a

home run, with 12 RBIs and a .288 batting mark.

And yet he's not satisfied. Hanis was noted for his defensive prowess at Canton and he has continued that at MSU. He committed five errors as a freshman (.974 fielding percentage) and has made two this year in 20 games (.978).

Perhaps his dissatisfaction with

both his offensive and defensive performances at MSU can be traced back to his Canton days. Hanis credits Child coach Fred Crissey with his development.

"Playing under Fred Crissey helped a lot," said Hanis. "He always worked you hard and never let up."

"Without him, I never would be where I am today."

**STILL, HANIS** believes he could be doing much more, both at the plate and behind it. At the plate, he wants to "be a more consistent hitter. I'd like to be a tougher out, and I'd like to hit with more power."

"I'm not satisfied yet. I hadn't been hitting the ball very hard until last weekend (four hits in three games vs. Ohio State). It's not that hard to be a .300 hitter in college."

# Keller hangs on to dream

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Keller graduated from Seabolt in 1973 and went to Eastern Michigan University where he played on powerhouse teams with such notable players as Bob Owehinko, John Martin, Bob Welch and Glenn Gulliver.

The Atlanta Braves drafted him in 1977, and within two years, he had worked his way up to the Braves AAA club at Richmond.

HE PLAYED four seasons at Richmond, but Atlanta's catching depth kept him from making the big club, and he finally signed with the Philadelphia Phillies as a free agent last year. The Phillies assigned him to Portland.

Though he has moved around quite a bit in his seven-year career, Keller doesn't seem to mind. The treatment he gets as a AAA ballplayer is as close as you get to the major leagues, and Keller has enjoyed every moment of it.

"I've had the opportunity to travel all over the

country," he said. "It would be more difficult if I was married, because it's hard on the family. But it's a lot easier living out of a suitcase when you're single."

Realistically, Keller's best chance of making the majors is as a DH or backup catcher.

But he needs a break.

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

An Environmental Review Board Record respecting the within project has been made by the above-named Farmington Hills, Oakland County, which documents the environmental review of the project and those fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request, at the Planning Office between the hours of 8:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M.

No final environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted, prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, in the Planning Office. Such written comments should be received at the Planning Office, 31555 W. Eleven Mile Rd., Farmington Hills, Michigan 48018 on or before May 9, 1984. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.
