Absorbing and emo-tional performances by Bethany Carpenter as Mrs. Venable and An-nette DePetris as Cathe-rine Holly kept my atten-tion on opening night at the Actors Alliance The-atter Company's produc-tion of "Suddenly Last Summer."

Carpenter's portray of the matron of the "O South" family got off to slightly shaky start, the initial moments, Ca south family get off to a slightly shaby tart. In the Inilian momenta, Carpenter seemed to reaching for the proper characterization at tempo. She found it quickly and over test it. Her character, indeed, got stronger as the play progressed.

DePetris, on the other hand, was strong from the moment that she act foot on the stage of the theater-in-the-round. She was particularly powerful in the play's closing moments.

Even though DePetris does not look the part that she played, she carried it off flawlessly. She played the ups and downs of the character well — turning off and turning on the various manners of Catherine Holly.

At one point in particu-lar, he did not seem to be perpieved enough about the dilemma he was fac-ing and his potential role

in the unseemly plan of Mrs. Venable. Clyne played the role much more effectively when paired with DePetris than when playing against Carpenter.

He, too, was more tentalive early in the production. Perhaps, both he and Carpenter were taken aback by the audience—or more precisely the lack thereof. The cast and crew easily outnumbered the audience on opening night. However, once rolling, the cast performed without a hitch.

FINE PERFOR-MANCES also were given by Emily Schreiber as Miss Foxbill, Peggy

Thorp as Mrs. Holly and Paul Hopper as George Holly, Hopper was partic-ularly affective in his sib-ling; rivalry moments with DePetris.

A few technical abortcomings or distractions failed to hurt the overall effort. But a word to the director: The sound of the birds chipping in the background was oversed and became almost distracting at times. Secondly, the use of a butane lighter seemed a bit inappropriate; Did they have these back then?
