the nursing home administration.

Twick and council members are still looking for volunteers who can spend one or two hours a week talking with residents who lack visitors, taking residents for walks, giving resident manicures, or helping with the activities planned by the activities directors, Debbie Galesano and Sharon Kurmanak.

Past monthly meetings of the council have focused on understanding the responsibilities of individual staff members, hearing concerns of residents, facilitating communications between res-

idents and staff, and involving the community in greater numbers and more

direct ways through programming and volunteerism.

To vie in national tennis tournament

Kelly Davidson, a junior at Harrison High School, will represent Michigan in the 18-and-under age category in Sevens Magazine's ninth-annual Tennis Tournament of Champions, May 6-12 in Mission Viejo, Calif.

Davidson started playing tennis at the age of 8, and currently ranks No. 11 in the Western Tennis Association 18's as well as No. 39 in the national 18's.

Most recently she advanced to the second round of the Fiesta Bowl 18's, played in Scottsdale, Ariz. last December.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Davidson of Farmington Hills and a member of her school's tennis team. She says she swims to unwind and expects to attend University of Arizona after graduation here.

Karman Wilkinson of Blaisfield will represent Michigan in the 16-and-under category. Nicole Ashare of Bloomfield Hills represents the state in the 14-and-under play.

The three are among the 159 girls chosen for the tournament rated the country's top-ranked players.

The tournament is sanctioned by the U.S. Tennis Association and is presented by the Maureen Connolly Brinker Tennis Foundation.
