

'Dovish' Vote By Ford, Esch

Two of Observerland's U.S. representatives voted to curb President Nixon's powers in the conduct of the war in Indo-China when Congress came to a showdown last week.

U.S. Rep Jack McDonald (R-Farmington) did not vote, being in his district at the time.

The Cooper-Church Amendment received the Senate's backing but must survive a conference committee. The House action didn't kill it, but did rob it of important stature.

The amendment would prevent the president from returning U.S. forces to Cambodia.

NR Endorses Local Candidates

Three area candidates for Democratic party nominations for Congress this fall will have the prestige of the leading national liberal publication, The New Republic, on their side.

Two in the 19th Congressional race have the magazine's endorsement. They are Livonia's Ronald Hecker, who also has strong backing from the local liberal faction of the Democratic party, the New Democratic Coalition, and Franklin Z. Adell, Novi industrialist.

In the 18th District Congressional race, Mrs. Annetta Miller, a leader in the Women's Liberation Movement, got the New Republic nod over union leader August Schelle and lawyer James Eltsman.

Others in Michigan faces to win the magazine's approval were incumbent U.S. Sen. Philip Hart, unopposed in the primary; Detroit incumbent Congressman John Conyers Jr. and Donald W. Riegle Jr., a Republican incumbent congressman from Flint.

State military veterans have been reminded by Robert M. FitzGerald, Veterans Administration regional office director, there is still time to complete college enrollment for the fall term.

FitzGerald urged veterans not to wait until the last minute if they plan to use their GI training benefits.

While many of the larger universities no doubt have already filled their freshman classes for the year, many smaller colleges and junior colleges will accept new students up until school begins in September.

The current GI bill covers men and women who served after Jan. 31, 1965. Present benefits provide \$175 a month for single veterans and larger amounts for those who are married.
