CNB Net

Rises 18.3%

City National Bank of Detroit has announced its net income for the six months ended June 30 reached a new high of \$1,109,888, or \$1.61 a share. This is 18.3% higher than the 1969 mark of \$935,136 or \$1.37 a share.

Total resources on June 30 were \$572,265,661, an 8% rise from last year's \$529,708,846. Deposits reached \$496,742,184, up 4.1% from the 1969 figure.

Kadish Urges Drug Education

Drug education in public schools is the best answer to drug abuse that wastes human life, Paul Kadish, Democratic candidate for 14th District state senator, told a group of supporters in Livonia last week.

He said, if elected, he will sponsor legislation that we have the necessary state funds to make such a program operational, beginning with immediate education for teachers.

"The time has passed when we can solve drug abuse by attempting to believe it is someone else's problem," said Kadish. "We must all work and learn together to end this menace."

"The villain is experimentation prompted by the mystery surrounding the taking and effects of marijuana, LSD, heroin and an entire spectrum of hallucinatory drugs," he said. "We know this happens in homes where there is inadequate communication between parents and children, but this is not the entire answer. 'It also happens in the 'best' of families, to the 'best' of children and in communities with modern, well equipped police working to stamp out the flow."

In conjunction with the Oakland County sesqui-centennial celebration, one of the highlights of the Women's Week, July 19-25, will be the first Ladies Soap Box Grand Prix Race. This event is designed to be a humorous take-off on the annual Soap Box Derby.

Several cars sponsored by the various women's clubs throughout Oakland County will take part. The race will take place on July 25 starting at 1 p.m. on the Oakland County courthouse grounds. The cars will be racing down derby hill in many forms, some being a baby buggy, a coffin and a gigantic beer can.

HUD Setup To Move To Detroit

WASHINGTON The operational management for all Housing and Urban Development projects in the state of Michigan will be transferred from Chicago to Detroit in September, according to U.S. Rep. Jack McDonald (R-Farmington).

McDonald said the new office will also assume the responsibilities of all services now performed by the Federal Housing Authority Insuring Office, and would be located in the Book Building.

William C. Whitebeck, special assistant to HUD Secretary George Romney, has been appointed director of the Detroit HUD office, McDonald said.

"This is a major step toward bringing local and federal governments closer together," McDonald said. "The Detroit office will be a responsive tool for the communities in Michigan involved in HUD projects," he noted.

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
