## Borgess wins Observer Relay title

Il was a fitting conclusion to a most exciting track and field meet. Blabop Borges: Fred Owens, the man who had earlier set an Observerland Relays record with a wift 10.8 in the 100-meter dash and anchored two other first-place relays, brought home the baton before anyone else in the final event, the 1,600-meter relay. As Owens crossed the finish line, Borgess begin celebrating its first-ever Observerland Relays champlon-ship.

Borgess won nine of the 18 events,
set three records and thed another capturing 109 points in the 14th annual
running of the relays, which took place
Saturday at Livonia Churchill!

Churchill placed second with 84
points and Piymouth Satem finished a
somewhat surprising third with 61
points. Farmington, missing two key
performers, placed fourth (43) and
Catholic Central (41) placed fifth.

"WINNING THIS MEET has been a goal of ours for a long time," said Spar-tan coach Gene Grewe. "This is a very strong team, but we've had strong teams in the past and haven't been able to win this. It's really terrific for the kids that we won. I know they really wanted it."

For a while, though, it looked like the heavily favored Spartans would again come up short at Observerland.

Churchili, thanks to the strong arm of Dave Mize, got off well in the field events and grabbed a quick lead. Mize had the best tesses in both the shot put (\$2.5-%) and in the discus (159-11).

Churchili took first in the discus and pole vault, second in the shot put and third in the long jump to bolt ahead. The Chargers maintained that lead until the 12th event.

"I really felt good about our chances going into the final four events," Grewe and. "I mew we had a good chance of scoring a lot of points as long as we didn't drop the baton." They didn't drop the baton, but they did drop Churchill out of contention. The Spartans took first in each, of the last four events.

WITH THE MEET being held on Churchill's all-weather track for the first time (the 13 previous relays were held on Redford Union's clinder track), times were bound to improve — and they did.

Borgess set a long jump record with a combined jump of 62-5%, breaking the old mark of 62-4 set in 1980 by Farmington. Borgess also established a new 800-meter relay mark going 1:30.7. The old mark was 1:30.8 (converted from 1:31.3) set in 1975 by Redford Union.

Despite his team's second-place finlish, Churchill coach Fred Price was

Besides the coam excitement, the meet produced moments of individual brilliance. Overse was super in all four of his events, blowing by everyone. Dave Homans and Jeff Felis gave the Garden City faithful something to cheer about. Felis high jumped 6-3 and bested. Churchill's Mike Mechan on fewer misses. Homann took the 1,600 run in a swift 4:24.3.

Livonia Stevenson, despite being zeriously out-manned, gutted out a sixt-place finish. Ken Dubois anchored two first-place relays for Stevenson, the distance medicy and the 3,200 relay. Farmington's Britai Looser went 12-5 to win the pole vault — perhaps the lone Falcon bright spot.

But when it was all said and done, and the final score was tallied, the Relays belonged to Bishop Borgess.


