Book circulation sets library record

A record-breaking circulation of 52,000 items during the month of March was reported to the Farmington Community Library Board of Trustees by library director Gordon Lewis.

"The record circulation comes as a result of a pattern," Lewis told the board. "During the past decade, there

has been a 105 percent increase in library use."

Community support for library service is also on an incline, indicated by gifts to the library in recent months. Major gifts include an Apple Computer, purchased in memory of Howard W. Thayer for Farmington Branch Library, and \$1,000 from Farmington

Hills Junior Women's Club to be used to purchase materials dealing with substance abuse.

During the board's spring meeting Lois Carey was elected president of the board, and members welcomed Jonathan Grant, appointed to the board

by the City of Farmington Hills for a four year term. Ernest Sauter was reappointed by the City of Farmington for a four year term.

One resolution was passed; to honor James H. Ebel, who served on the board from 1978-84.
