An August wedding is planned.

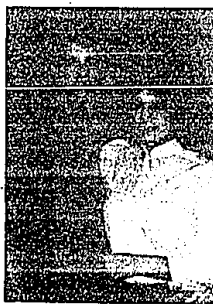


Chiadi-Smith

The bride-to-be is a graduate of North Farmington High School and Michigan State University, employed as a mechanical engineer for Hewlett Packard.

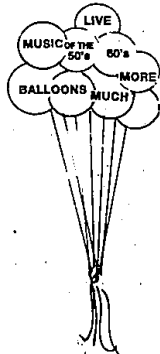
Her fiancé is a graduate of Arizona State University, employed as an electrical engineer for Hewlett Packard. An August wedding is planned in Betsford Inn gardens.
