# Search is on for beautiful babies

All babies whose first birthday was before June 1, 1984, are eligible for Farmington Area Jaycoo Women's annual Baby Beautiful Contest.

To enter, send a favorite photograph with it to: Baby Beautiful Contest, 20067 Frederick, Farmington 48024. On the back of the photograph write the baby's name, parent's name, address, telephone number and the baby's birthdate.

The contest continues as part of the chapter's child safety awareness program in connection with Buckle Up Babies (BUBS). Jaycoo Women were one of the forerunners in the program alerting mothers to protect their little ones with infant car seats long before the state law went into effect.

TO HELP in this behalf, the chapter bought the car seats to rent. It owns 50 of them now, and they are in constant rotation.

Infant seats can be rented for nine months, for \$10, plus a \$10 deposit. Most recently, six car seats for toddlers were bought, also up for rental on a short-term basis.

Proceeds made on the program go back into the community by way of the many programs and events the chapter plans through the year. All money that comes in the way of entry fees from the Beautiful Baby contest will be donated to combat AIDS (AIDS Infant Death Syndrome).

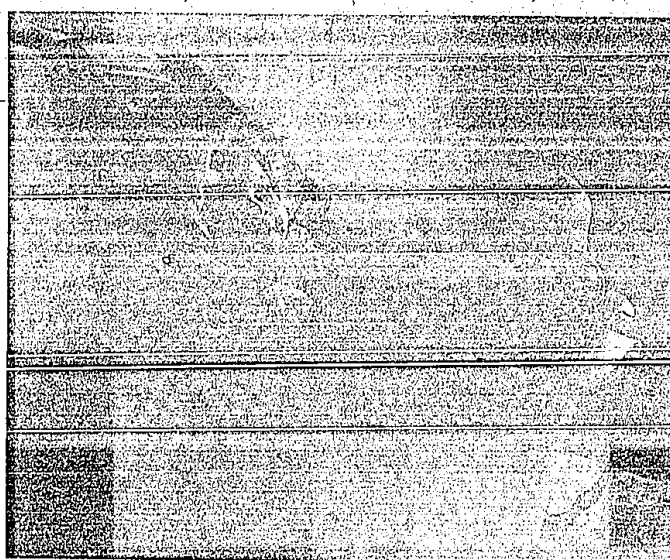
Deadline for the contest is June 30. Winners, who will be determined by the prize donors, will be announced in mid-July.

# New findings put more light on sun

Everyone knows by now that sun can burn, damage, and age the skin. But there are still some surprises: things about the sun that everyone doesn't know, and new counter-measures for sun control. think that oil-rich skin is immune to sun damage. This kind of skin burns just as much, but might be troubled by the added oil in most sun products. Oily skin (or any skin) can have the benefits of oil-free sun-screening in two degrees of protection, medium or extra-powerful. Either version absorbs harmful rays, keeps skin untroubled by sun or oil.

- Exfoliation is important to a smooth summer glow. This means the removal of those grayish-white dead skin flakes that look even whiter and flakier over tanned skin. There is a lotion made especially for flake-removal, also some fine-grained scrubs that do a good exfoliating job. Regular use of these keeps a tan looking fresh and polished.
