

Huber On Disruptions

Revolutionaries Our Enemies

PLYMOUTH "I happen to fall into the conservative corner, and I'm not ashamed of it at all," says State Sen. Robert J. Huber (R-Troy), a candidate for the Republican nomination for U.S. Senate.

Huber believes that "after 40 years of extreme liberalism, people are now returning to conservatism."

In an Observer Newspapers interview, Huber presented his opinions on both national and international issues, including campus unrest, inflation, big business, communism and foreign trade.

A former mayor of Troy, Huber is a cheerful underdog in his fight for the GOP Senate nomination against Mrs. Lenore Romney, hand-picked candidate of the party leadership. The winner will face incumbent Democrat Philip Hart.

AS CHAIRMAN of the Special Senate Committee on Campus Disorders, Huber has been attempting to discover the causes behind campus unrest. "The problem is that the persons behind student violence are confirmed revolutionaries," he says. "The SDS and Weathermen have written exactly what their program is and what they're going to do. They aim for the total overthrow and destruction of the United States."

The state senator, who says he admires Sen. Barry Goldwater, believes that those persons who create violence are "part of an organized effort." He cites as evidence the appearance of the same people time and again at various campus disruptions and different bombing attempts, such as the recent incident at a Flint Catholic church.

"We should treat these revolutionaries as enemies of our country and stop making it so very convenient for them to do all the things they want," says Huber. He blames the "confusion in our courts" and indecision on the part of leaders in inadvertently "fostering the enemy in this country."

COMMENTING on Communism and the Vietnam war, Huber scoffs at those senators who say Communism isn't a threat in Southeast Asia. He also mentioned a recent meeting he attended at which Detroit's Ukrainians honored their war heroes who died fighting Communism.

"I wonder if those senators would say these heroes were fighting a big bogeyman," continued Huber. "I still remember Khrushchev saying 'We will bury you.'"

Lenore Names Her Local Team

Two prominent local Republican women and a Livonia doctor will head the campaign for U.S. Senate candidate Mrs. Lenore Romney, she announced at a VIP cocktail party in Livonia.

Mrs. Dolores Kory of Redford Township and Dr. Thomas Padden of Livonia will be campaign coordinators in the Wayne County portion of the 19th Congressional District (Redford, Livonia and Northville).

Mrs. Mary Dumas is to be Livonia campaign chairman. Mrs. Kory is presently a member of the Republican Party State Central Committee and is a former chairman of the Wayne 19th District Republican organization.

Sen. Huber in private life is president of the Michigan Chrome and Chemical Co. Described in campaign literature as a man "seasoned in business," Huber has definite opinions on the role of industry in society.

"Industry ought to carry its story to the people. It should be socially conscious and active in the community."

In the area of pollution, car companies have been working for many years to create better controls, according to the senator. "But they haven't made headlines," he mentions. "Taking lead out of gasoline was a continuing research program for years."

ON ECONOMIC issues, Huber says, "We've got to work on reducing unemployment and keeping the lid on inflationary pressures."

"What we've been doing for the last 30 years under a socialist scheme was to cut up the pie into different slices, and the size of the piece anybody got depended on who was in power," says Huber.

The senator was referring to the gross national product (GNP) as the pie which he feels should be distributed so that "there will be more for everybody."

Huber says that President Nixon has done "a pretty creditable job" in reducing the percentage of inflationary growth. "He hasn't eliminated inflation nor do I think he's going to. You have to recognize that he's got a hostile Congress, which isn't very anxious to pass any of his programs."

UNEMPLOYMENT is another big problem facing the country, states the senator.

While he sees reducing the war budget as "essential and saving tax dollars," Huber mentions that this move "stops a lot of jobs. There just are no simplistic answers to this problem."


The senator, who has been involved in foreign trade because of his company, says that the U.S. should pick up world markets. However, he is opposed to trade with Communist countries.

"To us it's incredible that we're at war with the communist in Vietnam and haven't been trading all along with them."

Recently, the Soviet Union asked Henry Ford II for personnel help during the Vietnam war. Ford refused, but according to Huber it was a "U.S. government decision." "The government realized we were building up our enemies," he said.



Wilson C'ville President

Clarencville Board of Education elected a new president recently, and re-elected its present secretary and treasurer.

Veteran member Thomas E. Wilson was named president at the board's organizational meeting July 6. He succeeds Dr. Martin T. Wechsler.

A member of the board for the past 14 years, Wilson lives in the Livonia portion of the school district and is employed by Hydramation Engineering Co. of Livonia.

CONTINUING AS secretary is Norman L. Hunt, long-time Farmington Township resident, who has been on the board for the past four years. He is the owner of Micro Machine Corp.

Re-elected treasurer was Robert M. Erickson, Wayne State University administrator who has three years service on the board. Erickson, who also lives in the Livonia portion of the district, heads Wayne State's urban extension credit program.

Dwyer Dissents On Endorsement

Robert Dwyer of Plymouth cast the only dissenting vote when Branch Managers Association members decided to endorse Charles Gray for Democratic nominee to run for secretary of state last week.

Gray, a former state representative from Ypsilanti, announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination, with the association executive committee endorsement and outgoing Secretary of State James M. Hare's blessings.

A candidate will be nominated at the Democratic state convention in Grand Rapids Aug. 22-23.

Gray's wife is manager of Hare's three branch offices in the Ypsilanti area.

THE BRANCH managers, under state chairman Charles Deamond of Redford Township, have been energetically seeking a candidate whom they believe could win and protect their positions.

The group has so far withheld its normal party contributions because it claims the party has not put enough emphasis on the secretary of state campaign.

Dwyer, AS CHAIRMAN of the 2nd Congressional District party organization and a branch manager in Plymouth, has been in the middle of the fracas.

He said he voted against the Gray endorsement "because I don't think he's the best candidate; he's not known, and it is foolish for us to endorse until the nominee for governor is known."

Dwyer said he believes the gubernatorial candidates "certainly should have a vote in who is on his ticket, because it will have an influence on the outcome of his race."

Would Gray help patch up the rift between the managers and the party? "I don't know," said Dwyer, who hinted that he considered information unknown to the public significant but wouldn't explain.

Pursell Calls Kuhn Ineffective

Republican challenger Carl Pursell of Plymouth slashed at incumbent Republican 14th District State Sen. George Kuhn of West Bloomfield again while speaking before Walled Lake Jaycees.

Pursell said Kuhn, whom he is challenging Aug. 4 for the primary nomination, is "a man who has given his constituents oratory and confusion instead of effective representation."

"Time and again, George Kuhn has failed the voters when they needed him most," said Pursell.

"When the interests of his district are at stake, my opponent is frequently off on a bonodoggle. If he does manage to get where the action is, it's over by the time he makes up his mind what to do."

PASSAGE of Senate Bill 1183 was cited by Pursell as an example of Kuhn's failure to be alert at the interests of the voters in his district.

"The bill includes a section that could put many new public access sites on lakes in Oakland County without even

giving the property owners there an opportunity to voice their feelings," Pursell said.

"My opponent voted for the bill without bothering to find out how it might affect his district. Now that I have pointed out the possible effects, he is scrambling around trying to cover his failure by getting the governor to exercise a lame veto on the bill," Pursell said.

Pursell also rapped Kuhn's actions on the income tax vote and on the abortion issue.

"IN CONSIDERING how their senator has let them down in this latest matter," Pursell said, "the voters may be reminded of his classic failure on the 1967 income tax vote."

"After spending most of his time making speeches against an income tax, he was absent from the Senate when the proposal came up for the key vote. Then, after he was brought to Lansing to vote on the issue, he abstained," Pursell noted.

"The recent abortion debate in the Senate was another example of how ineffective my opponent is," Pursell said. "First he supported and voted against it. Perhaps he thinks the safest way to represent his district is to try to get on both sides of each issue."

"I THINK IT'S time the people of the 14th District had a senator who will be on the job and on the ball when their interests are at stake," Pursell said.

"I can assure them that as their state senator I will get the homework on issues done before they come to a vote...not afterwards."

"I can assure the 14th District voters that I will be on the Senate floor fighting and voting for their interests, not running around looking for chances to get my name in the papers by making speeches on subjects I know nothing about."

Candidates To Speak

Several State Senate leaders and state officials will be among hundreds of persons expected to participate in a recognition dinner for Sen. George W. Kuhn (R-West Bloomfield) at 7:30 p.m. Monday, July 20, at the Raleigh House, Telegraph and 10-Mile Road, Southfield.

James P. McHugh of Northville, chairman of the "Friends of Senator Kuhn" who are sponsoring the event, said Circuit Judge Edward S. Higgins of Detroit would be toastmaster.

Among those scheduled for short tributes to the senator from the 14th senatorial district will be: Sen. Robert Vanderveen of Grand Rapids, Senate majority leader; Sen. Charles O. Zoller of Benton Harbor, caucus chairman; Sen. Robert Richards of Saginaw, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee; and Sen. Gilbert Burley of Ann Arbor, chairman of the Committee on Corporations and Economic Development.
