Health master's classes offered

Dietitians, physical therapists and dental hygienists are only a few of the health care professionals who have little teacher training but who are responsible for teaching patients preventative health care techniques.

To bridge the gap, Mercy College of Detroit offers a master's degree program for allied health professionals who wish to improve their teaching skills.

Registration is now going on for fall enrollment in Mercy College's master of science degree program in Allied Health Education. The program, which was first implemented in last fall, is unique to the Detroit area.

The Allied Health Education master's program is geared to meet the needs of allied health professionals who would like to expand their role in the areas of patient education and continuing professional education, including clinical instruction, development of instructional materials and small group instruction.

Program director Carole Dwyer said, "The common focus for the health care students is to improve their ability to provide quality educational experiences. Our focus for patient education is to provide preventative information via curative information. We want patients

to understand how to better take care of themselves in areas such as diet and exercise. Most of that is the health care professional's responsibility. They realize that they can educate the patients better if they have a background in theory and application of theory such as the master's program provides."

Features of the program include clinical instruction and evaluation, practical teaching experience, and an opportunity for research in areas of special interest to each student.

After completing the 36 required credits, program graduates will be prepared for a variety of educational positions

in both academic and clinical settings.

The program's classes are scheduled to accommodate part-time and full-time students.

Graduate students are eligible for several financial aid programs funded by the federal government and the state of Michigan.

BACK PAIN AND CURVATURE OF THE SPINE

Curvature of the spine is a common occurrence. When the curve is to the right or left of the middle of the back the curvature is called scoliosis. When the curve is in excess of the normal contour of the back the condition is called an accentuated kyphosis (humpback) or accentuated lordosis (swayback).

To what extent are these abnormal spinal curvatures the cause of back pain?

There is no easy answer. First, many individuals who suffer with prolonged back pain have completely normal spinal curves. Second, there are people with scoliosis who have sudden onset of back pain. Their back x-rays often show changes that took years to occur. Yet during those years these people had no back discomfort.

Therefore I am careful to look for other causes before ascribing a patient's back pain to their spinal curvature.

Most back problems are the result of sudden or unusual back muscle stress. It is likely that heat, rest, and patience will be as successful in patients with spinal curvature as in individuals with back pain who have no such abnormalities.
