For those who like Mexican food, there's a new restaurant called Casa Lupita at 2085 W. Big Beaver Road in Troy. On the site of the former Stouffer's Eden Glen, Casa Lupita was opened a couple of weeks ago by Casa Lupita Restaurants Inc. of Dayton, Ohio. The renovated restaurant and bar has a contemporary Mexican exterior and an interior decor accented by hand-painted Mexican tiles. Specialties of the house include Arroz con Pollo (chicken breast with mushrooms, tomatoes and green onion in a savory sauce) and Souffle de Mexico (chile peppers stuffed with beef in an egg souffle and sauce). Guacamole, fried ice cream and margaritas made with fresh-squeezed lime juice are other specialties. The real Mamma Lupita opened her first restaurant in Seattle.

Cafe de Detroit

Its first outdoor cafe, called Grand Cafe de Detroit, on "Detroit's North

Bank," has been opened at the St. Regis Hotel in Detroit's New Center. The cafe is open for breakfast, lunch and dinner until 7 p.m. The light menu is displayed on a chalkboard in an antique frame. A cold soup de jour, fruit and pasta salads, filled croissants and desert are available. Diners also may order cafe filtre, a cup of coffee brewed to order.

Dining at Trumbull Terrace will be an option for music-lovers attending the Meadow Brook Music Festival, which opens its 21st season Thursday night on the Oakland University campus near Rochester.
