total content and not alone by its title."
The court's order — not yet accompanied by a written opinion — put the Apop plan back into effect and set a new filing deadline of July 10. The previous deadline was June 2.

Sen. Nichols.

Sen. Nichols commented, "I'm not really surprised by the Supreme Court rolling. I'm an attorney, and I thought the lower court ruling was correct."

Sen. Faust commented, "All the Su-preme Court justices should be given milk and cookies and sent to bed. They're sick. The practice has been going on a long time. The same thing (gutting another bill) happened on their last pay raise."

ALTMAN SAID he didn't know what to tell House candidates because he hadn't seen the high court's order.

The court order held the nominating procedures invalid. This indicated House candidates would have to file new petitions or \$100 filing fees.

Altman said that with new filing deadlines, it might be impossible to print absentee ballots by 21 days prior to the Aug. 7 election. Names must be printed, proofread and corrected, he said.

"We're already on a very tight sched-

ule," he said, adding it also would be difficult to get machine ballots out to cities and townships.

Another effect may be the upsetting of precinct delegate elections, he said. Precinct boundaries may have to be redrawn so that they aren't split by legislative boundaries.

"What the court has done in many cases — and I don't fault them because they're not election people — is that it doesn't take into consideration the far-reaching effects when they make a rulling."

IN NEIGHBORING Wayne County, Clerk James Killeen it might be physi-cally impossible to hold the primary until as much as a month later than the scheduled Aug. 7.


Altman, however, was less pessimis-

tic.

If the primary is delayed, Killeen said, the schedule for district and state reoventions also would be thrown out of kilter. State Republicans are scheduled to meet Aug. 23-26 and Democrats Sept. 7-3 to nominate candidates for state educational posts and the state Supremc Court.

"And if there are any recounts in the primary, we jeopardize the November election," Killeen said.

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
