EVERY TIME an artist attempts to draw something be or she searches for the lines, shapes and colors that were most likely unknown to them. The word revelation' means to become aware of the previously unknown, so artists not celly happen upon revelations, they look for them.

Even people as close to you as your own family teembers, offer fantatic revelation as you attempt to draw them. The subtle little bump that a 3-year-old has for a nose, the strength in your father's furrowed brow or maybe you never noticed the beauty and look of concern in your mother's eyes.

How him is your parakeet? What shade of green is your unwhella piant?

How fascinating it is to be an artist. Some need to fly to far a way places to

find beauty. But the watchful eye of an artist finds beauty in the common place, such as the folded and cracked leather of a high top work boot—the free-flowing lines of the united laces and the aliny brass of the worn cyclets.

SOME NEED to "get way from it all" and the artist seeks to understand what was always there. To do so is to look at your surroundings wherever you are. Revelation will come to you as you look and study the lines, shapes and colors of all you attempt to draw.

"Ob, I'd love to draw this," she says. "Well whatever ..." is my usual comment. But everything she selects offers her

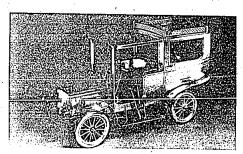

### Institute shows Faberge collection

"Faberge: 'i.io Forbes Magazine Cel-lection' brings 200 masterpieces by Po-ter Carl Faberge to the Detroit Insti-tute of Arts through Sunday, Aug. 12. Fabergo (1846-1920) headed a firm which became werld-renowned for its celebrated imperial Easter Eggs — prized possessions of the last crars of Russia — as well as for jeweled filo-wers, fantasies, figure groups, and ani-mals.

This is one of the largest Faberge collections in the world outside of the Russian Kremlin and the Royal Collection in England.

The Detroit icon includes eight of the Imperial eggs, among them the spectacular "Coronation" egg (1887) presented by Cara Nicholas II to his wife, Alexandra, in cammemoration of their accession to the Imperial throne.

THE STARBURST — engraved, five-inch gold egg opens to reveal a tiny reproduction of their coronation coach, complete in every detail — rock crystal windows, platinum tires and diamond-set gold trellis work.

Others in the exhibition are the 'First Imperial Egg' of 1994, the 1890 'Spring Flowers' egg the 1921 'Tamaissance' egg, the 1920 'Chanticleer' egg and the '15th Anniversary' and 'Orango Tree' eggs of 1911.

The Art Institute showing will be the public debut of several recent additions to the collection, including a splendid silver motor car and a monumental folktoric desk garniture, according to Christopher Forbes, vice president — associate publisher, who joined Forbes Magazine in 1970 as curator of the

company art collection.

His father, Malcolm S. Forbes, chairman and editor-in-chief of Forbes Magazine, began the Faberge collection in the mid-1960s.

Although the Imperial Eggs are the most famous of his creations, Fabergo produced many other elegant objects which will be shown: enameled and jeweled frames, miniatures, clocks, boxes, cigarctic cases, swelry and ac-cessories and houshold objects.

FABERIGE took over management of his father's jewelry firm in St. Pet-ersburg at the age of 24. The success of the House of Faberge is linked to the imperial patronage of the Romanoff family.

In 1918, the Russian Revolution ended the Romanoff dynasty with the execution of Czar Nicholas II, his wife and five children. The Faberge workshop, which at one point had employed more than 500 designers and craftsmen, also ceased to exist and Faberge himself escaped to France. He died in Lausanne, Switzerland in 1920, at age 74.

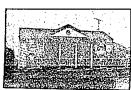

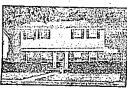
