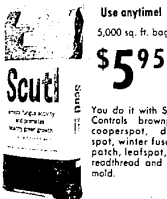

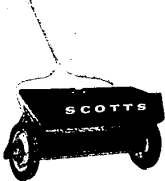

Levin Seeks Vocational Aid

This state's efforts in helping local communities provide meaningful vocational education for high school students who don't go to college have been totally inadequate, says Sen. Sander Levin. Democratic candidate for governor.

"We are wasting our greatest natural resources, the potential skills of our people," the 34-year-old Levin said. "Michigan has failed to develop an even halfway sufficient program for providing vocational education."

Levin, who served as State Senate minority leader in 1968 and State Democratic Party chairman in 1968, said that although 70% of Michigan's students do not enter college, less than 1% of its high school students were enrolled in real and meaningful occupational training programs.

"In 1968," Levin said, Michigan graduated 115,000 high school students. Only 33,000 who received some occupational preparation and the 7,000 who should graduate from college have saleable skills in today's tight labor market.

Levin said it should be the policy of the state to see that young men and women who do not continue their education beyond high school are provided with opportunities to acquire saleable skills as effectively as the present educational system prepares other young people to be college students.

Because of the present deficiencies, Levin has developed a seven-point program calling for a basic commitment by the state to support a free, public system of vocational education.

Other points in Levin's program include:

- A massive state funding for building vocational-technical facilities on a regional basis.
- A feasibility study to determine if industry, which benefits greatly from good vocational training, could help share the costs of building and operating occupational facilities.

Cranbrook Honors Fox

Dr. Denis L. Fox of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography, University of California, has been appointed to the Cranbrook Institute of Science distinguished scholar chair.

The Distinguished Scholar program, begun in 1966, brings outstanding scientists to the institute. Residents follow their own programs, taking an active interest in institute affairs.

Dr. Fox is professor emeritus of marine biochemistry at Scripps, where he began teaching in 1951. His special fields of research are the biochemistry of animal biochromes, the growth and metabolism of marine animals, organic matter in marine waters and sediments and biochemical fossils.

Dr. Fox has served for many years as a consulting marine biologist for national and state agencies and for industrial organizations concerned with marine fouling and underwater surfaces and conditions.

He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and is a past Research Fellow of the Rockefeller and Guggenheim foundations.
