



It takes much more work to demonstrate our carring by being lirm and etlecking by our standards. Discipline is particularly difficult in this day and age when many of us are not part of an extended family or community with phaned values. Because bringing up children can be a lonely and confusing job, the following words of support are offered:

Romember that you are the grown-up. It by your lob to make the rules. Your judgment, although not infallible, really is better than a children.

Remind yourself that, by saying "no" where appropriate you are not depriving your child. Rather, you are doing him or he' a service by helping him or her to become a socialized, self-controlled, responsible adult.

Realize that, in the long run, children are comforted by rules and limits.

Seek support from other parents, informally or in organized parent support groups.
