

# McFrock's survives Festival softball game

The 16th Annual Farmington Founders' Festival Softball Tournament proved to be a carbon copy of the previous year's tournament as McFrock's of the Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation Industrial "B" League.

They were defeated in the 30-team double-elimination tournament as Jeff Sheeran continued his fine play in being awarded the Most Valuable Player award.

For the second straight year, he collected 12 hits at 10 at-bats that included a double, triple, four home runs and 12 runs batted in. McFrock's, managed by Bob Hisko, began its march to the championship with victories over Manistowic 8-5, Bud Light 10-3, B & J Builders 9-1, Keford Collision 5-3, and ending the tournament with a 19-1 victory over Rustic Pub.

In the championship game against Rustic

Pub, managed by Mike Godbey, McFrock's jumped out to a 3-0 lead on home runs by Sheeran and Gene Seaborn, however, before the first inning ended, Rustic Pub collected five hits to tie the game at 3-3.

Loing pitcher, Jim Holton, shut out McFrock's in the top of the second which allowed his team to take the lead with three unearned runs on a costly 1-out bases loaded error by McFrock's.

In the third inning McFrock's closed the gap to 6-5 on a two-run round tripper by Jeff Wiska but Rustic Pub opened up the lead to 11-5 on six hits to end the third inning.

The 4th and 5th inning brought McFrock's back to within one run at 11-10 with homers by Sheeran and winning pitcher Jim Outlaw. They led the game with a 9-run sixth inning to capture the championship.

Members selected to the all-star team included Mike Kotzin, Bud Light; Dan Gasser and Steve Orr, Keford Collision; Bob Johnson, Rustic Pub; and Kevin Werner from McFrock's.

point, I personally feel we can't afford not to sell this property."

"It is my personal opinion that for a half-million bucks plus, it's my responsibility to sell this property," Wallace said.

Before school district residents will benefit from the sale than the number of homes that will go towards maintenance and new equipment for the district.

district conducted a study of surplus school district property. Many private citizens participated in the study and helped make the decision to put the property up for sale, he said.

In the county sheriff's race, Nichols' overwhelming victory countywide was mirrored in his hometown of Farmington Hills.

Gathering 34,696 votes countywide, Nichols trounced Republican opponents James Stewart and Bill Ortmann. Stewart received 14,338 votes, followed by Ortmann with 6,919 votes.

In Farmington Hills, Nichols took 82.2 percent (3,603) of the total vote. Stewart logged 8.8 percent (316) of the vote. Ortmann, a Farmington Hills resident, received 9 percent (394) of the votes cast in the city.

Nichols' Democratic opponent Hansen also carried Farmington Hills with 46.8 per cent (414) of

the vote. His Democratic opponents James D. Condu and Niles E. Olsen received 19 percent (183) and 34.2 percent (303) respectively.

COUNTYWIDE, HANSEN received 7,960 votes. Looking forward to the fall election, Nichols Marks and Sever say they are gearing up for active and competitive campaigns.

"Ben (Marks) and I will certainly have some contrasting viewpoints," Sever said, maintaining it will be an "interesting campaign."

"I definitely think the fall election will be much different," he said.

Marks will continue with running the type of campaign he ran for the primary, he said. Marks plans to talk directly to the public, making himself available to talk with individuals and/or groups, he said.

Even with his overwhelming victory, Nichols doesn't plan to sit on his laurels in the face of November's election.

"You have to treat every candidate as a threat," he said.
