Council to make costs public

Farmington Hills City Council mem-bers now will have to account publicly for their on-the-job expenses.

In a 5-2 vote Monday, council adopt-

The policy requires council members to fill out a "pre-expenditures approval form" prior to spending public money for conference seminars, luncheons or other functions.

Public discussion of the proposed expenses is also required before council approval is given.
"I think this would be a protection
..." said Councilwoman Joan Dud-

ley. Roquiring council members to get council approval before they spend city money will discourage in yone "from ever saying they inappropriately spent city money." Dudley said.

"Councilman Joo Alkabeth, who suggested using the form, said he refused to attend conferences and seminars because he does not want anyone years later to question his spending habits.

Hills voters to decide city charter addition

Farmington Hills voters will be asked to give the city authority to levy up to an additional 1.5 mills for 20 years for capital improvements.

If approved, the city's total taxing authority woold be increased from the current 10-mill charter limit to 11.5.

Council voted, 5-2, Monday to put this variation of an earlier charter amendment proposal on the general election ballot in November. Council-

men Donn Wolf and Robert Anzlover opposed the proposal.
Wolf favored earmarking 1.5 mills for capital Improvements out of the city's 10 mill limit. Anzlovar favored a charter, amendment proposal but diagreed with establishing a time limit to the proposed 1.5 mill levy for improvements.

In July, council committed itself to a charter amendment, proposal asking for an additional 1.5 mills for 20 years, earmarked specifically for capital improvements.

But council later feared that the pro-posal would be confusing to voters. To straighten out the contusion, May-or Charles Williams in early August suggested leaving the charter i 10-mill limit provision intact while adding a separate section pertaining to the addi-tional 1.5 mills for capital improve-ments.

WILLIAM'S VARIATION of the original proposal accomplishes the same thing but would separate operating millage from capital improve-

ments miliage.

The proposal also would protect the city's 10 milis for operating purposes while still having an additional 1.5 milis for necessary improvements. Without a charter 'amendment, the current 8-mill levy plus the additional 1.5 milis for improvements would bring the total tax levy to 9.5 mills. That would leave tuture councils one-half mill for operating expenses. "The difference is really that the first (proposal) was an attempt to amend the taxation section (of the

charter)," said City Manager William Costick. "They are aimilar in that each (of the two proposals) would raise total city taxing authority to 11.5 mills." Although council this week was presented with four options for funding the city's six-year capital improvement plan, little time was lost in deciding to ask voters to add a new taxing section to the charter. "If you want to hind future conscile you will have to amend the charter."
