Nanci Goldsmith is a world-class gymasst born in Detroit and raised in Bloomieté Hills.

She attended one of Michigan's most prestigious gymnastics schools ibroughout her preteen days. Goldsmith undertook advanced training at the acclaimed National Academy of Artistic Gymnastics in Eugene, Orc.

Goldsmith was so good she participated in the Games of the Summer Olympiad XXIII.

Goldsmith, an American citizen, was granted a dual citizenship with Israel for the sole purpose of competing in the Olympics as a member of that com-

try's gymnastics team.
"I competed at the 1981 Maccabi Games in Tel Aviv (Israel) for the Unit-ed States team," said Goldsmith, a soft-

spoken 18-year-old who returned home Mooday afternoon after attending the Olympics' dazzling closing ceremony the previous evening.

"They (Israell officials) went to my mom and told her they wanted me to compete for Israel in the world championships. At first, we had to find out if we could do it legally. Once we found out it was OK, I made the decision."

GOLDSMITH SAID the main reason she decided to compete with the Israeli team was she could start her college education at Stanford University while continuing to train in the United States. Demands by the Israeli Olympic officials weren't as strict as if she were trying out for the U.S. team.

The American officials, for instance, required all U.S. team members to train full time under their guldance. Goldsmith would have been asked to postpone her first year of college.

Furthermore, Goldsmith indicated,

there was no guarantee she could even make the American team after all that intensive training. Her spot on the israeli team was practically assured. "My No. 1 priority all the time was going back to school," said Goldsmith. "(Getting the right education) is what's going to be most important to me the rest of my life.

"I would have had to stay out of college for a year if I were on the U.S. team," she said.

GOLDSMITH AND Limor Friedman composed Israel's two-person women's gymnastic team. "It was only supposed to be me, but, because of the (Soviet-bloc) boycott, Limor got to come," sold Goldsmith.

Goldsmith, who attended Brookside Elementary and Bloomfield Hills Jun-ior High School, finished 31st in all-around. That was the same competition

They had police sitting down by the stairs and we had secret codes to zet off the burners to open the doors." Goldsmith, who trained at the Steve Whitlock School of Gymnastics during

her younger years, plans to finish her college carver at Stantord where she is now on a gymnastics scholarship.




