Charity 'locks up' funds


"Ball or jall" is the theme of metro

memory lane

Memories, memories . . . have we got the memories. And we'd like to share them with you. Using local newspaper files, we're dishing up generous silees of life in the Farmington community from 40, 30, 20 and 10 years ago.

AUG. 17, 1944 —
"THEME'S A SIGN over in the window at Hatton's Farmington Hardware Store that we'd like to
have you look at the next time you chance to walk
by," noted an item in the Around the Block column
on the front page of the Farmington Enterprise.
"Don't just look at it though, take the time to read
it and let it sink in. The sign says, Let's have more
community spirit." Have you ever thought if you
have any community spirit, let alone have enough
to make a difference to your city? It's one quality
we could all increase, and the world would be a
better place for it."

BANANA CAKE was "on special" at the Farm-ington Bakery for 44 cents, "Also a nice line of rolls, cookles, fried cakes, bread" read an ad-vertisement for the bakery.

PLAYING AT THE Farmington Civic Theatre was "Girls on Probation" with Ronald Reagan and Jane Bryan, and "Thousands Cheer" in Technicolor with 30 stars and three bands.

"YOUR CAR will mean more in 1944," read an advertisement for Catlett Hi-Speed Service at Grand River and Grace in downtown Farmington. "Take care of your car while you are still locky enough to have it."

FARMINGTON HIGH School Principal V.O. Bates encouraged all students enrolling for the first time and their parents to visit him in his office to discuss a program of study.

AUG. 19, 1954 — SURVEYING STARTED on the sites of the three new elementary schools planned for the Farmington Township School District. The school sites were on Gill Road south of Nine Mille, at Shiawassee and Tuck roads and at Middlebelt and 14 Mile roads.

"OLD MISTER SUN got together with his pal, Mr. Humidity, last Sunday and together they succeeded in chasing a goodly number of city dwellers out Grand River way, jamming up the highways in pretty good shape," said the Around the Block column. "It was the first heavy flow in several weeks. Maybe the two culprits figured it would be a good exercise in preparation for the anticipated record flow of traffic over the coming Labor Day weekend."
