

# Charity 'locks up' funds

"Ball or jail" is the theme of metro Detroit's first Great American Lockup being held Tuesday-Saturday, Aug. 14-18 at Tally Hall in Farmington Hills.

Sponsored by the American Cancer Society, the event features a mock jail where anyone can be locked in with local luminaries. A judge determines the amount of bail people must pay in order to be released from the 16-by-46-foot jail.

The jail is equipped with telephones as it is necessary for individuals to make phone calls in order to raise the necessary bail.

When bail is paid to the American Cancer Society, the prisoner is released.

Money raised during the four-day event, (the goal is \$60,000), will benefit the Oakland County Division of the American Cancer Society.

A list of local celebrities scheduled to be jailed includes Channel 7's Dayna Eubanks, Channel 4's Dwayne Riley, deejay Peter Carey from radio station WCLS, WCXI's Hank O'Neil, Allen Hughes of the Detroit Panthers, Sonny Van Arman, Elliott Trumbull, Mel Rosenbaum, Rita Bell and Larry Spencer.

Thursday the event will be held from noon to 8 p.m. and Friday from noon to midnight. Both days there will also be an informal fashion show.

A street- and break-dancing exhibition will be featured Saturday 2:30-3 p.m. followed by a jail "break-dance" contest in which the public is invited to participate.

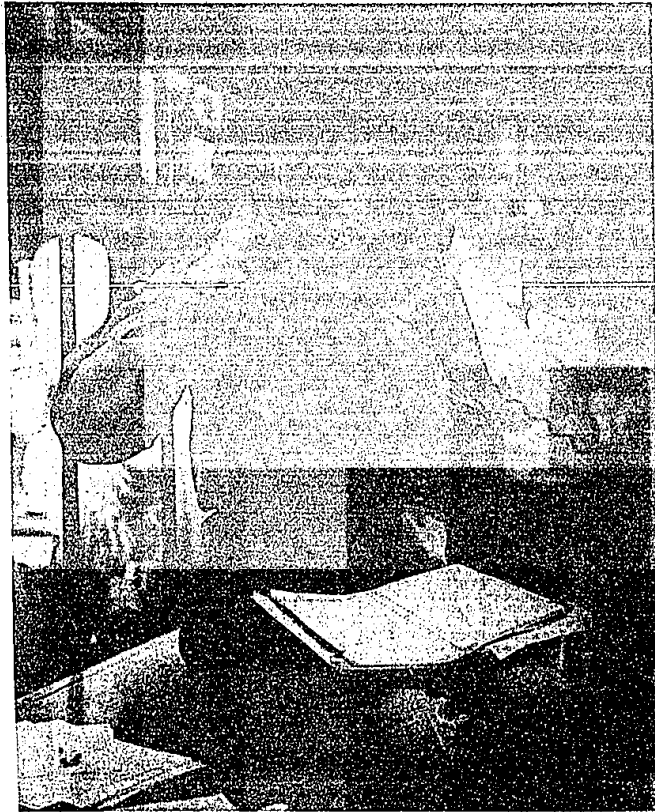

## memory lane

Memories, memories... have we got the memories. And we'd like to share them with you. Using local newspaper files, we're dishing up generous slices of life in the Farmington community from 40, 30, 20 and 10 years ago.

AUG. 17, 1944 —

"THERE'S A SIGN over in the window at Hutton's Farmington Hardware Store that we'd like to have you look at the next time you chance to walk by," noted an item in the Around the Block column on the front page of the Farmington Enterprise. "Don't just look at it though, take the time to read it and let it sink in. The sign says, 'Let's have more community spirit.' Have you ever thought if you have any community spirit, let alone have enough to make a difference to your city? It's one quality we could all increase, and the world would be a better place for it."

BANANA CAKE was "on special" at the Farmington Bakery for 44 cents. "Also a nice line of rolls, cookies, fried cakes, bread" read an advertisement for the bakery.

PLAYING AT THE Farmington Civic Theatre was "Girls on Probation" with Ronald Reagan and Jane Bryan, and "Thousands Cheer" in Technicolor with 30 stars and three bands.

"YOUR CAR will mean more in 1944," read an advertisement for Callett Hi-Speed Service at Grand River and Grace in downtown Farmington. "Take care of your car while you are still lucky enough to have it."

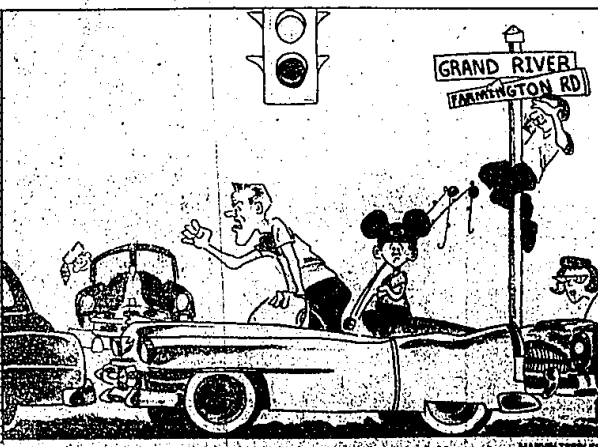
FARMINGTON HIGH School Principal V.O. Bates encouraged all students enrolling for the first time and their parents to visit him in his office to discuss a program of study.

AUG. 19, 1954 —

SURVEYING STARTED on the sites of the three new elementary schools planned for the Farmington Township School District. The school sites were on Gull Road south of Nine Mile, at Shawansee and Tuck roads and at Middlebelt and 14 Mile roads.

"OLD MISTER SUN got together with his pal, Mr. Humidity, last Sunday and together they succeeded in chasing a goodly number of city dwellers out Grand River way, jamming up the highways in pretty good shape," said the Around the Block column. "It was the first heavy flow in several weeks. Maybe the two culprits figured it would be a good exercise in preparation for the anticipated record flow of traffic over the coming Labor Day weekend."

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Grand River through Farmington was a congested thoroughfare on summer weekends back in 1954.
