The University of Michigan-Dearborn is inviting area art collectors and artists to submit photographs of their works to be included in the third annual art exhibition, "The Dearborn Collection," at the University of Michigan-Dearborn.

The exhibition, which will run from Nov. 6 to Dec. 10, will feature works of art from Dearborn and Dearborn Heights, including works by artists who lived, studied, or taught in those cities or who have other close connections with the area.

Color slides of works to be considered must be submitted by Monday, Sept. 17. Submissions will be reviewed by a panel of Detroit area art collectors, including W.
