

Sinai health center opens

Philanthropist Nathan I. Goldin recently was honored at the formal opening of Sinai Hospital's new Nathan I. and Betty Goldin Health Care Center in West Bloomfield.

Members of Sinai's medical staff, board of trustees and other individuals close to the project were invited to attend the reception held in the center on Farmington Road, north of Maple.

A statement was made by Maxwell Josepy, president of Sinai's board of trustees, thanking Goldin. A Steuben rose vase was presented to Goldin by Irving Shapiro, executive vice president of Sinai, as a token of the hospital's appreciation for his generous contribution which helped make the center a reality.

A native of Russia, Goldin attended law school in Detroit and was admitted to the practice of law in 1927.

In 1939, he organized Practical Home Builders with Samuel Hechtman

and Jack Sylvan. Between 1939 and 1972, he built several thousand residential and commercial properties from Riverview to the northwestern suburbs.

IN 1972, he sold the business and is now secretary and treasurer of Practical Investment Co.

A Southfield resident, Goldin is a founding and life member of Adat Shalom Synagogue.

After the presentation, guests at the reception toured the new facility which offers the following Sinai services: rehabilitation medicine, cardiovascular fitness and rehabilitation and outpatient psychiatry. Private offices of Sinai physicians specializing in internal medicine and dentistry also are available at the new center.

The comprehensive rehabilitation medicine services include consultation and evaluation of rehabilitation and pain and motion problems, as well as electromyographic examinations.

Thermotherapy, whirlpool, traction and exercise in a gym are some of the physical therapy services offered. Activities of daily living evaluation and treatment, exercise therapy and splinting are services offered by occupational therapists. In addition, treatment of speech and hearing problems is available for adults and children. For more information, call 661-9400 or 493-6980.

THE CARDIOVASCULAR fitness and rehabilitation program is for people recovering from a heart attack or heart surgery or people who want to start a supervised fitness and health

education program to reduce their risk of developing heart disease. A thorough evaluation, including an exercise tolerance test, is used to determine fitness and establish an individual exercise prescription. For more information, call 661-9440 or 493-6982.

Comprehensive outpatient psychiatry services also are offered, including programs of the Problems of Daily Living Clinic, for people wishing to defuse immediate problems, such as stress or family difficulties, before they become more complex and require intensive intervention. Polish history, literature, art, language and culture will be the subjects of several classes offered this fall by St. Mary's College, Orchard Lake.

The classes may or may not be taken for academic credit. All will meet on the St. Mary's campus, except "Elementary Polish for Adults" which will be offered in the Polish Century Club, 5181 E. Outer Drive, in Detroit.

Following are the classes and the times they will meet:

• "Polish History: 966-1795" — traces the history of the Polish State from its origins to its dismemberment and absorption by foreign powers in the 18th century. Taught by the Rev. Eugene Edyk, associate professor of Polish studies at St. Mary's, the class will meet 7-10 p.m. Mondays.

• "A Survey of Polish Literature in English Translation: The Middle Ages through Classicism and Pre-Romanticism" — includes study of selected works by major writers including Jan Kochanowski, Mikolaj Sep-Szarzynski, Andrzej Morstin and Ignacy Krasicki. Offered 1-4 p.m. Thursdays, the class will be taught by the Rev. Walter M. Zebrowski, professor of Polish studies at St. Mary's.

• "A History of Polish Art" — surveys Polish art from the pre-Christian era to present day. Teacher Marian Owczarski, St. Mary's artist-in-resi-

dence and visiting instructor in art, will offer the course 7-10 p.m. Wednesdays.

• "Elementary Polish for Adults" — will be taught by Polish language and culture instructor Robert Geryk 7-10 p.m. Tuesdays.

• "Elementary Polish I" and "Intermediate Polish I" and "Advanced Polish I" — Geryk will teach the elementary and intermediate classes. The elementary class will meet at 10 a.m. Monday, Wednesdays and Fridays; the intermediate, at 9 a.m. the same days. Monignor Zdzislaw Peszkowski, professor of Polish, will teach the advanced course at 10 a.m. Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

• "An Introduction to Polish Studies" — provides an overview of the Polish legacy and the Polish American community. Topics will include pre-historical Poland; historical Poland; Poland, land of nine cultural planets; Polish Americans; and the Polish American community, 1984. Zebrowski will lead this class 7-10 p.m. Tuesdays.
