Questions Goals Of Rap Line

Farmington city councilmen still have doubts about the bylaws of the Farmington Area Advisory Council, Inc. (FAAC), the parents of the community-wide drug prevention program to be launched in Farmington.

The FAAC was formed as the governing body for the Farmington Area drug prevention program being headed by the Rev. Ralph Rideout.

THE COUNCIL is composed of city, township and school representatives plus community leaders and persons connected with the Drug Rap Line started by Rideout in Farmington Township.

Policies and specific programs have yet to be formed but the intent is to expand the Rap Line on an area-wide basis and establish drop-in centers for teens to visit, obtain counseling or information.

The city council is concerned that the bylaws do not specifically state the FAAC's purpose as drug prevention, fearing the organization may have carte blanche authority.

Councilmen John Allen and John Richardson both want specific mention of drug abuse in the bylaws. Allen said the FAAC's responsibilities should be limited so it does not interfere with the authority of parents, schools or the church.
