With each new season come new challenges, but this year Oakland Uni-versity soccer coach Gary Parsons will have a greater number than in

the past.
"We lost 11 guys off last year's

Parsons stopped short of calling it a rebuilding year, but there are key holes he'll have to fill. Gone are top scorer Morris Lupence and his twin brother Mike; midfielders Nick O'Shea and Steve Maxivogianis; and backs Munadel Numan and Terje

Morris Lupence, O'Sbea and No-man will be hardest to replace. Each was an All-Mideast region selection, and Numan was All-America as a freshman. Both Lupence, who netted if goals and is assists, and O'Shea, who is playing professional soccer in Oklahoma City, graduated, Numan has been sidelined by poor grades.

OF THE 11 new players on the OU roster, seven are recruits, two are walk-ons and two are redshirts. These are the players the Pioneers' season

'They all have to either step right in and start or fill top substitutes roles," said Parsons.

Such a big turnover in personnel
threatens to end offer regional domi-nation. The team, 18-3 in 1933, made
