metro Detroit's freeway system, commercial areas and airports. Arboretum's high visibility is another factor the three partners are depending on.

Besides its visibility to passing motorists on I-698, Arboretum is also joining a corridor filled with other major corporations. Among those are Manufacturer's Hanover Mortgage Co., Texas Instruments, Alexander Hamilton Insurance, Jervis B. Webb and the Robert Bosch Corp.

Tenant occupancy of the first of the six buildings is planned for next spring.

As construction on the project is underway so is the job of finding tenants. That work is in the hands of Burland, Reis, Murphy & Remble Inc. which is the Arboretum's exclusive leasing agent.

As soon as the first building is leased, work will begin on the second, and so forth, Hughes and Katzman said.

"We will build as the market dictates. We don't want to have a situation of empty buildings," Katzman said.

Arboretum's targeted opening of its first building next spring will coincide with Farmington Hills' planned widening of 12 Mile Road, from Orchard Lake to Farmington Road.

Botsford opens drug-care unit

Botsford General Hospital has opened a medical and therapeutic program for alcoholism and other drug dependencies.

"Our first objective will be to get the sick person of the substance by carefully monitoring the withdrawal syndrome," according to Dr. Morris Fineman, medical director for the Botsford chemical dependency unit.

Among the features of the program will be a 24-hour admission line to eliminate delays in admitting persons to that unit. Arrangements can be made seven days a week by calling 471-8584.

Upon admission, each patient will

receive a medical examination. While in treatment, patients will be instructed on the physiological effects and phases of their addiction and will be encouraged to support each other's recovery.

After 3-5 days, patients may be referred to an outpatient or residential program or to other resources within the community.

Patients will be exposed to motivational and educational programs involving group, individual and family therapy, recreational activity, nutritional counseling and Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous involvement, according to Fineman.
