

RU stops North, NSL title up for grabs

The tumultuous Northwest Suburban League girls basketball race has taken another surprising turn.

Redford Union, previously winless in NSL play, stunned previously unbeaten North Farmington Thursday night, 41-38.

That catapulted Livonia Franklin (3-0) into the top spot, leaving North and Westland John Glenn (each 2-1) one game behind.

The Raiders came in injury-riddled expecting to face an injury-riddled Panther team. The first surprise RU had in store for the Raiders was a healthy Julie Marchand and a healthy Kelley Kennedy — two Panther starters who have been injured.

But the Raiders still managed to have things their way throughout three quarters. With Lisa Mummert leading the charge (finishing with 12 points), North carried a 25-18 lead into the final quarter.

The Raiders extended their lead to

12 points with five minutes left to play.

At that point, RU coach Terri Anthony put Marchand and Kennedy (each in foul trouble) back into the game along with Lisa Vial and Marie Becker — the four were wild for the next five minutes.

They rattled off 10 unanswered points. Then Marchand, who dominated the boards at both ends, ripped down a rebound and drove the length of the court to lay in the go-ahead hoop. RU never looked back.

"It was the first time all four have been back together at the same time," Anthony said. "And really, because of foul trouble, the fourth quarter was the only quarter they were in at the same time."

RU (2-5 overall, 1-2 in the NSL) outscored North 23-13 in the final quarter. Marchand finished with 15 points. Kennedy had eight.
