#### Liquor controversy brews

Oakland Circuit Judge Robert Temp-lin is expected to decide Monday whether to continue an order restrain-ing the city of Farmington Hills from granting its last Class C liquor license of this decade.

Templia issue the temporary order last Monday at the request of the owners of Capraro's, a proposed restaurant near Haggerly and Grand River. The City Council had voited to issue the electronic to Capraro's on Oct. 9 but rescluded that decision a week later.

The restraining order prevented council from considering or approving a license for one of five applicants until the hearing today.

Frank Palazzolo, Capraro's attorney, refused comment on the matter until after the hearing.

refused comment on the matter mind-after the hearing. But he acknowledged that one of the reasons for the restraining order was council's rescission of the license for the restaurant. City attorney Paul Bibeau said Templin is expected to decide today whether the restraining order will be

continued against the city.

If it is continued, council will be restrained from taking action on the license until a hearing is scheduled on "the merits of Capraro's complaints," said City Attorney Paul Bibeau.

THE RESTRAINING order is the latest in a series of events concerning the issuance of the liquor license. Controversy began almost three weeks ago when council set out to issue the last license ached a stalemate on its lirst two choices for the license when Mayor Charles Williams and Councilman Joe Alkateeb announced they would abstain from discussing and voting on the issue. Both indicated they had a possible conflict of inferest because each is or may be professionally involved with an applicant. Because both abstained, leaving only
