Can Hall Survive Showdown Tuesday?

August 4, 1970, will mark the end of the toughest political battle engaged in by Farming-ton Township Supervisor Cur-tis H. Hail. When votes are tallied, Curt will either auffer his first polit-ical defaat or confirm he is umheatable and will continue in office until he chooses to re-tire.

FOR THE PAST decade, Hall has been re-elected be-cause the opposition has never mustered a real strong candi-date.
