They found that most who smoked regularly during high school continued to smoke afterward, although many said they wished they could stop. Unlike the findings for alcohol and marijuana, there was no evidence that changes in living arrangements led to any changes smoking.
The U-M researchers suggest that this is because eigaretie smoking is a particularly addictive form of drug use. Those who continue to smoke by the end of high school do so because they are "hooked."
