Limos to roll in Farmington

Michael Reggish, a Farmington chiropractor, plans to expand his business — into limousines.
Reggish got the go-ahead from the Farmington City Council in the form of a taxi-cab license to operate the Absolute Class Limousine Service from 32328 Grand River in the same building where he practices chiropractic.
The vote, coming during the Nov. 19 council meeting, was 4-0.
"It's kind of a change of pace from chiropractic," said Reggish last week from his Southfield home. "It's taking care of people in other ways. I feel I'm helping people by showing them a good time for a night or a week."
Reggish said he charges by the hour for the limo service. His current rate is

\$140 for the first three hours and \$40 an hour thereafter. A 15 percent gratuity is required.
Reggish said he intends to begin the service "as soon as possible. We've already hired two drivers."
City Manager Robert F. Deadman said, "The public safety department has investigated the owner of this business. As a result, they found no basis to object to the license request."
He added, "We further recommend if council issues a license for the operation of this limousine service, that the purpose of the license be specifically stated; therefore, the license would not be transferable to operate an additional taxi-cab-type vehicle in the community."

Deadman said he believed that the proposed limousine service "would have no impact on the existing taxicab business."



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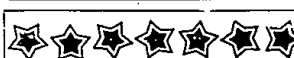
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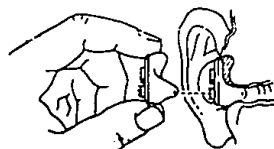


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
