The meet featured many sterling individual performances, but none more brilliant than Salem's Dave Dameron. Dameron, ranked No. 1 in the state at 125 pounds, breezed through the 121-pound weight class Saturday. In the finals, he pinned Scott Bolan of Eaton Rapids in a swift 14th Salan, no slouch, was fourth in the state a year ago.

For his efforts, Dameron was named the meets' Most Oulstanding Wrestler.

Dameron's championship was the only event the Rocks won, but they scored in eight of 13 events. Deais Dameron, Dave's younger brother, placed second at 100, tosing to Joe Lators of Portage Northern, 5-2. Andy Ward was narrowly defeated at 147, as Portage Northern's Bob Heaps trimmed him 4-3.

Brian Goins and Mike Turney were double winners as well. Goins captured 400 free relay in 3:27.47.


