Give your houseplants a lift

Within the home this is a good time
to evaluate the health of your potted
plants. If you have several potted
plants which don't need repotting in
fresh soil, take a kitchen fork and let
some air in the soil by starting at the
outer rim within the pot and raking the
soil surface with this fork, with care
not to disturb the center of the plant.

YOU SHOULD have some fertilizer, either powder or liquid, in your storage to be used on this occasion to give your plant a boliday gift from you.

It is always a good idea to keep a bag of good soil in your storage area so that you may attend to your plants' health when you are in the mood. If your plants look as though they need a lift, the leaves may be clogged and would benefit by rinsing them off by water. After all, plants breath through their leaves and if the surface is dusty, they show their displeasure by a sad appearance. If you feel a small-sized plant would benefit from a good dunk in water, cut a slit in a place of aisunnium; fold a length which would be the radius from the trunk of the plant to the edge of the pot. Fill a bucket half with water and prepare some atrips of old sheeting about 1½ inches wide, — stick one end of the sheeting down in the soil of each pot and the other end in the bucket which should be placed higher than the roots.
