

Trip north a losing venture for Pioneers

The annual trip north for Oakland University's basketball squads is always a treacherous one.

The Pioneers always have trouble at places like Michigan Tech and Lake Superior State. That legacy remained intact when both OU teams fell to their Lake Superior counterparts Thursday.

The Pioneer women's team blew a 10-point halftime advantage and lost 63-59, while the men narrowed a 12-point deficit to 2 but could force no closer in an 83-75 defeat.

OU'S WOMEN ran off 11-straight points for a 35-23 lead with 6:44 left in the opening half. The Pioneers lead

was narrowed to 10 at the half and Lake Superior got back into the game by scoring 8-straight to open the second half.

OU answered with 6 points of its own before the Lakers strung together 15 points for a 48-41 lead. The Pioneers eventually fought back to tie it on Brenda McLean bucket, and the game remained close until Erica Ledy hit 2 layups in a 23-second span for a 57-53 Laker lead with 1:47 left.

McLean's 14 points was best for OU, now 8-8 overall and 3-2 in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC). The senior forward also had 8 rebounds. Sarah Knuth contributed 10 points and 9 rebounds, and center

Kim Nash collected 10 points, 10 rebounds and 5 blocked shots.

Vonnie Schimp tossed in 11 points and grabbed 9 rebounds for Lake Superior (10-3 overall, 3-3 in the GLIAC). The Lakers led by that margin at the half (42-30), but OU scored 7 in a row at the start of the second half.

Still, they got a superb performance from Howze, who scored 24 points (11 of 17 floor shots), grabbed 7 rebounds and passed off for 5 assists. Rob Skinner added 14 points, 8 assists and 8 rebounds, with Freshmen Pete Schilf pitching in 12 points and Scott Biltinger 10.

Tony Avant and Mike West paced Lake Superior (8-8 overall, 3-3 in the GLIAC) with 14 points apiece. Kevin

Tucker and Mark Mohr had 13 each.

WRESTLING WIN IS DUAL
Jerry Umlin kept his win streak intact as Oakland University won its first dual meet of the season 37-10 Wednesday over visiting Siena Heights.

Umlin, wrestling in the 167-pound class, triumphed 6-0 over Adam Sletnicki to run his record to 9-0. Other OU winners were Dave Wilgen (142), 16-5 over Rob Domsior; Pat Stano (180), 7-0 over Ron Mozetti; and Lester Walls (heavyweight), a pin in 2:37 of Matt Moll.

OU is now 1-3 in dual meets this season.

Homecoming no joy for Shasky

John Shasky forced a feeble smile. "My family and friends were all here for the game," he explained. "I was ready to play tonight. Unfortunately, none of my teammates were."

Shasky was disappointed, and he had every right to be. His University of Minnesota basketball team had just been humiliated in front of 11,483 fans—at least a handful of which were acquainted with the Birmingham Brother Rice graduate—by the University of Michigan.

THE FINAL, lopsided score was 97-55. It was the worst defeat by a Minnesota team since 1919, and the biggest margin of victory for a Michigan team in Big 10 play since 1944.

"We never reached that level of intensity we needed to win in the Big 10," Shasky said in trying to explain the rout. "We're not the kind of team that can walk into a gym and beat a good team. We have to come prepared."

"We're going to forget about this one immediately." What aggravated Shasky was that he turned in a fine game, but got almost no support from his teammates. The 6-foot-11 junior muscled his way inside early, hitting five of seven floor shots and three straight free throws for 13 points in the first 13 minutes of the game.

HIS THREE-POINT play with 7:30 to go in the half pulled Minnesota to within 27-26. Moments later, teammate Tommy Davis drained an 18-foot jumper and Minnesota had a 28-27 lead.

But that was it for the Gophers. Michigan scored the next 11 points and put together a 18-2 streak to

finish the half on top 43-30. The situation deteriorated for Minnesota in the second half; the Wolverines scoring string reached 31-5, giving them a 58-33 cushion with 14:25 to go.

Shasky played 33 minutes before retiring to the bench with the game out of reach. He finished with 18 points, connecting on 6-of-10 field goal attempts and 6-of-7 free throws.

IT WAS A typical game for Shasky. He's averaging 11.7 points per game, ranking him 23rd in the conference, and he's third in field goal accuracy (81 percent) and eighth in rebounding (7.4). Michigan dominated the boards Thursday (39-29), with Shasky limited to four rebounds.

"Shasky was best early," admitted Michigan coach Bill Frieder. "He kept them in the game. When he stopped (scoring), the game got away from them."

Shasky stopped scoring for a simple reason: He wasn't getting any opportunities. "They put Robert Henderson on me in the second half, and he did a good job defensively," Shasky said, then added, "I scored 13 quick points, and my teammates didn't look for me."

His coach, Jim Dulcher, agreed. "The only guy on our club who gave a Big 10 effort was John Shasky," the Minnesota coach said. "When he got the ball he did something with it. We didn't get the ball to him (in the second half). We started taking jump shots, and that's the quickest way to get buried."

ALL OF WHICH was nice to hear but was little solace to Shasky. His Gopher team is not as bad as Thursday's outcome might indicate. They're 9-5 overall and 2-2 in the conference, with homecourt wins over nationally ranked Illinois and Iowa. "That's why I say we can play so much better," said Shasky. He refused to dismiss the loss, using the difficulty of winning on the road in the Big 10 as an excuse.

"We've played on the road," he said. "We went on a western trip and trailed (Pac-10 powerhouse) Oregon by 13 with seven minutes left, and we won." What was left unsaid was that records don't count in the Big 10. A team is only as good as its current performance. Past efforts and future potential mean nothing, a lesson Shasky knew well and hoped that his Gopher teammates now understood.
